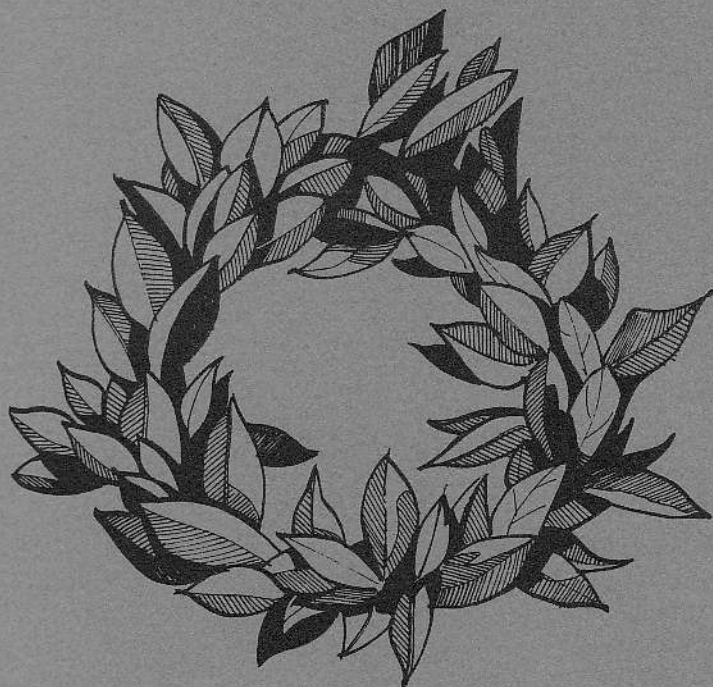

PAUL LOPEZ

He began his career in softball in 1938 at the age of 14.

Two years later his team, the Phoenix Lettuce Kings, won the Arizona championship and participated in the Amateur Softball Association (ASA) World Tournament in Detroit, Michigan. He threw his first tournament no-hitter and was selected the most promising young player of the tournament.

His first post-war achievement was winning the National Softball Congress World Tournament held in Phoenix in 1947.

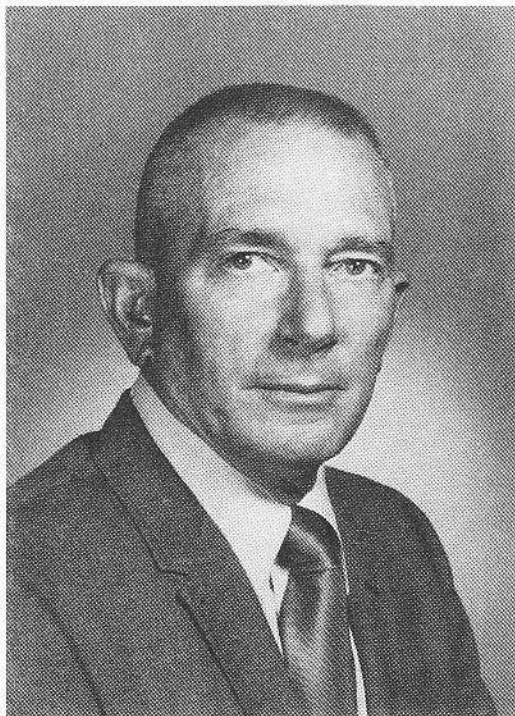
In 1948, he came to El Paso to become the top hurler for the Deal Motor Co. team. He took this team to two International Softball Congress World Tournaments in Greeley, Colorado.

He pitched a 20-inning game against Toronto, Canada in the 1949 tourney, winning 1-0. This was to stand up in the ISC record books as the longest World Tournament game for 20 years.

He has participated in 20 World Tournaments, winning two. Fourteen of these were with El Paso teams, including the two national championships.

He was named to the All World Tournament Team six times and voted the Most Valuable Pitcher four times.

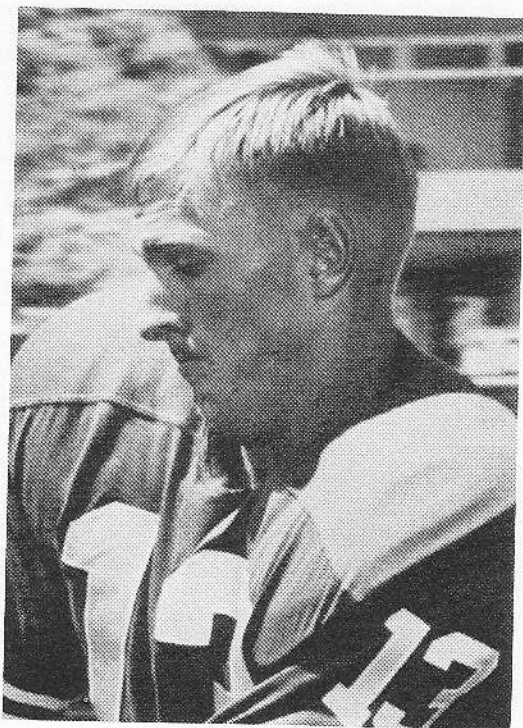
C. D. JARVIS

Clarence Jarvis was born November 3, 1915 in Austin, Texas. The family moved to Odem, Texas in 1921 where C. D. started school and lettered in football, basketball and track. He did the same at Texas A & I and served all three sports as team captain in his senior year, 1938. He spent three years as Athletic Specialist during World War II, and upon leaving the military in 1945, he came to El Paso High School, where he has coached for 28 years.

His primary fame came in the area of basketball coaching where his record speaks for itself. District title 1946; State title 1947; District title 1948. He won district titles twice in the 1950's; won district in 1965, and third in the State. Won district this year, and his team has been rated in the top ten all year long.

Mr. Jarvis has been voted "Coach of the Year" on three different occasions. He is also director of Physical Education at El Paso High School, having served in this capacity since 1946.

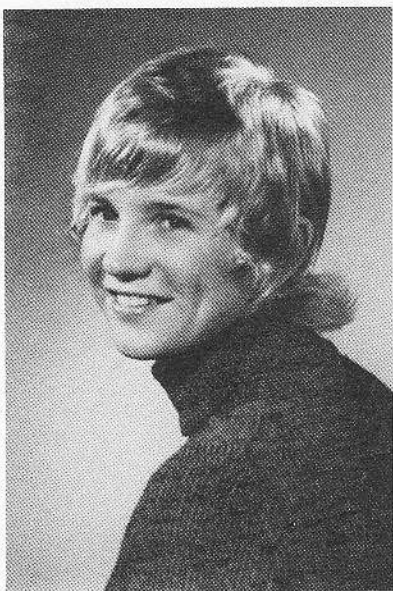
CHUCK HUGHES

Chuck Hughes, flanker back for the Detroit Lions, died of a fatal heart attack during a National Professional Football League contest in November, 1971. Although not blessed with size nor exceptional speed, he developed an almost uncanny ability to be in the right place at the right time.

Records he established at the University of Texas at El Paso stand today. In 1965 he had 80 receptions for 1,819 yards and set a school record with 12 pass catches in a single game. During his three years at UTEP he scored 21 touchdowns for 126 points, second highest in UTEP history.

Chuck was drafted by the Philadelphia Eagles and did a creditable job for four years with a cellar dwelling team before being traded to the Detroit Lions. Today, Chuck's widow and his son, Shane, live in El Paso, the City that Chuck had chosen as his home.

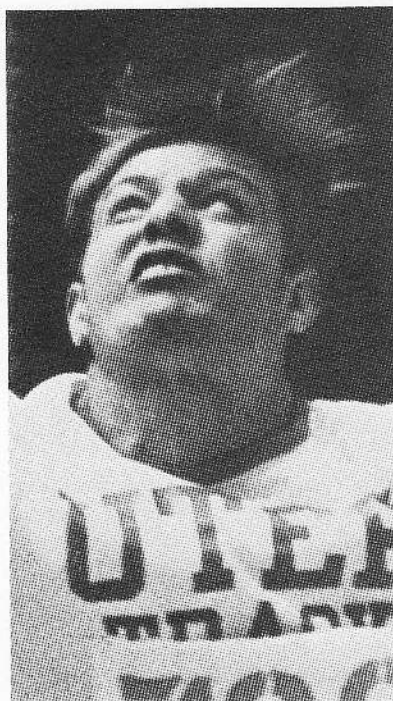
ATHLETES OF THE YEAR



JAN WELSCH

Jan Welsch is a graduate of Burges High School and swims for the El Paso Aqua Posse Swim Team. 1971 was an outstanding year for Jan. She became the first Texas girl ever to break 18 minutes in the 1500 meter freestyle and she qualified for the National Championship in six events. She received the Lilly Kniep Award as the outstanding female swimmer in the state of Texas, and set three new records in the 200, 500 and 1500 meter freestyle. Her outstanding performance qualified her for the Olympic Trials to be held in August. She is one of only three Texas female swimmers to qualify for these trials.

Jan has been named to Swimming World's "Top 25 In the World".



FRED DEBERNARDI

Fred DeBernardi is a 6-5, 274 pound senior at the University of Texas at El Paso and his immediate aim is to represent the United States in two Olympic events—the shot put and the discus.

"De-Bo" as he is known to his teammates, has thrown the shot 67 feet 3 inches and the discus 201 feet 3 inches.

Fred, a native of Saugus, California is undoubtedly one of the top weight men in the world today. At the Sunkist Invitational meet in Los Angeles in January, he beat his long-time idol, Randy Matson, with a throw of 66 feet 9½ inches.

Fred has been picked in the pro football draft even though he did not play football last season. His size, speed and agility (he runs the 40 yard dash in 4.6 seconds) tag him as an outstanding pro football as well as Olympic Track prospect.

LEE TREVINO

Trevino won six major tournaments in 1971, including the U.S., British and Canadian Opens during a month's time of non-stop PGA competition. He also won the Danny Thomas Memphis Classic, Tallahassee Open, lost in a playoff at Kemper Open, finished second in the National Airlines and tied for third at the Greater Jacksonville, Houston Champions International and the Atlanta Classic.

That year he finished second only to the "Big Bear" Jack Nicklaus in official PGA earnings (\$227,000) but was voted the PGA player of the Year. Nicklaus pocketed \$240,000. Other honors for Trevino included Male Athlete of the Year by the Associated Press, Sportsman of the Year by Sports Illustrated magazine, winner of the 22nd annual Hickok Professional Athlete of the year, International Sports Personality of the Year by the British Broadcasting Association, Sporting News Magazine's Man of the Year and Texas Athlete of the Year.
