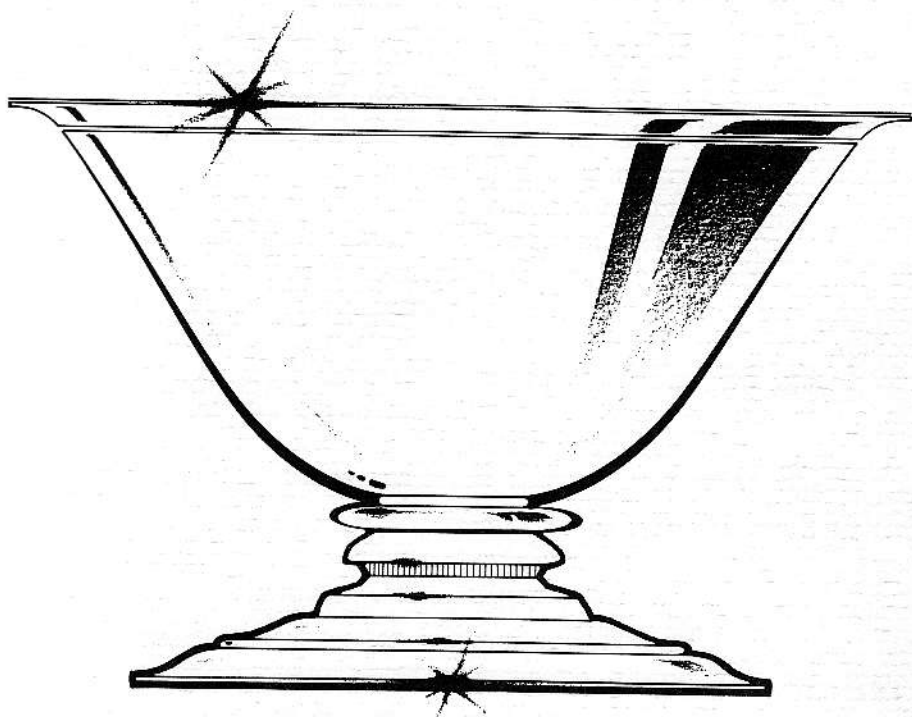

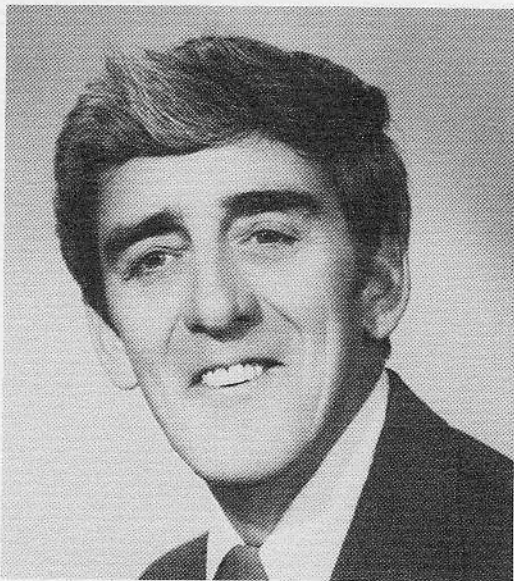


C. M. HENDRICKS

The late Dr. C. M. Hendricks was the man behind the development of the Sun Carnival's Sun Bowl post-season game. It was his idea to pattern the entire Sun Carnival organization and celebration after that of the Pasadena's Tournament of Roses celebration. Undoubtedly, even he would have been amazed at the growth of the Sun Carnival from its humble start in 1935 to the present day.

Born and raised in Ohio, he attended Miami University and the University of Cincinnati, earning football letters at Miami before obtaining his doctor of medicine degree in Cincinnati. He came to El Paso in 1906 and remained here as a leading civic figure until his death in 1953. In 1954 the Sun Carnival's board of directors named the Sun Bowl's most valuable player award in his honor.

JUD MILTON

A familiar voice to El Paso sports fans for many years is that of Jud Milton who has achieved fame for his versatility in the radio and television broadcast of sports.

Milton, who began play-by-play of UTEP basketball games two years before the arrival of Don Haskins, has either called the action or given the color reports on football, basketball, baseball, ice hockey and rodeoing.

His biggest thrill in sports came in 1966 when he was assigned to call the action of the NCAA basketball playoffs at College Park, Maryland where the Texas Western Miners, now UTEP, won the national basketball championship over a favored Kentucky team.

Jud is now an announcer on Radio Station KHEY in El Paso and is known to thousands of listeners on his early morning show. In addition he does sports broadcasting for the station.

DALTON HILL

Dalton E. Hill, a high school tennis coach whose record is unmatched among schoolboy mentors, achieved his greatest fame as coach of Irving High School's tennis teams from 1960 until his retirement in 1974.

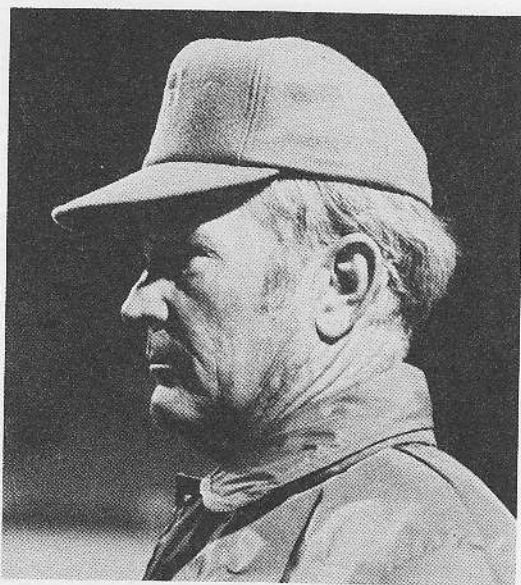
A graduate of Iowa (Tex.) Park High School, Hill earned collegiate letters in five different sports at Abilene Christian College including two in tennis and track, and four full years in baseball, basketball and football.

Hill came to El Paso's Irvin High School in 1960 and tutored the Rocket net squad to the boy's city championship eleven times, while leading the school's girls team to the title seven years. He won numerous titles at the Sun Carnival, Cotton Bowl and Texas State championship tournaments.

Possibly his greatest achievement was the development of Irvin High School players who achieved fame in college, including his own son Van who became a first-team NCAA tennis All-American. There were 25 other players who attended college on tennis scholarships and a number are now in the tennis coaching ranks.

BOBBY DOBBS

Bobby Dobbs holds the distinction of starting on two national championship college teams while an undergraduate, then achieving great success as a coach at University of Texas at El Paso, as well as in Canadian professional football.

Dobbs earned three letters in basketball and football, as well as all-state honors, at Frederick High School, Oklahoma. He moved on to Tulsa College where he lettered as a fullback before switching to West Point in 1943. He was a starting fullback for the national championship Army team and, in the same year, was a starting guard on the West Point championship basketball team.

Bobby coached at West Point in 1952 and returned to Tulsa in 1954 where he was selected national "Coach of the Year". Following the 1960 season he moved on to Canada where as head coach of the Calgary Stampeders he compiled a 38-23-3 slate, including four play-offs.

He was named head coach at UTEP in 1965 and immediately turned a winless team into an 8-3 entry with a victory over Texas Christian in the Sun Bowl. Two years later his Miners (7-2-1) topped Mississippi in the Sun Bowl. He resigned as Miner head coach in 1972 with a 41-35-2 record. Bobby is presently in the contracting business in El Paso.

PETE MELENDEZ

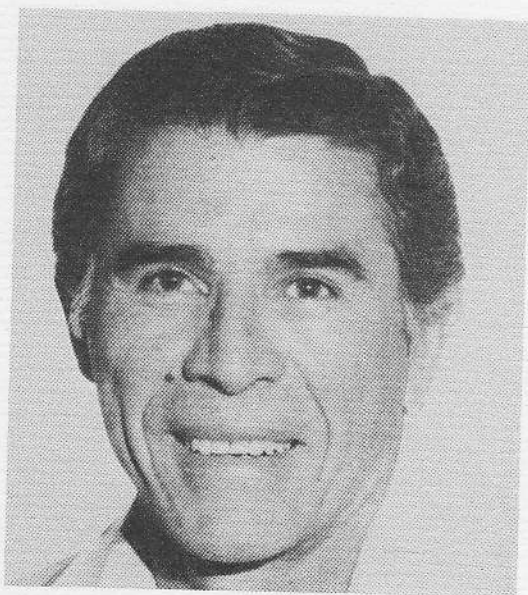
Pete Melendez, El Paso's lone double National Golden Glove boxing champion, amassed an amateur record of 374 victories and only six defeats. His is one of the finest boxing marks in the nation for it includes both the Texas and National Golden Gloves titles twice, in 1953 and again in 1956.

In 1950, Melendez won the El Paso flyweight championship and came back to win it again in 1952. In that year he was also the first runner-up in the state competition. His first Texas title came in 1953 and he went on to win the national title. The remarkable point is that Melendez, after winning his titles in 1953, went into retirement and had to retrain for his 1956 appearance which was also culminated with the state and national titles.

Melendez took up boxing when he was 14 to strengthen his arms that had been broken in an automobile accident. After winning his 374 of 380 amateur matches, he took a fling at professional boxing but withdrew when he could not obtain sufficient financial backing.

OSCAR VILLAREAL

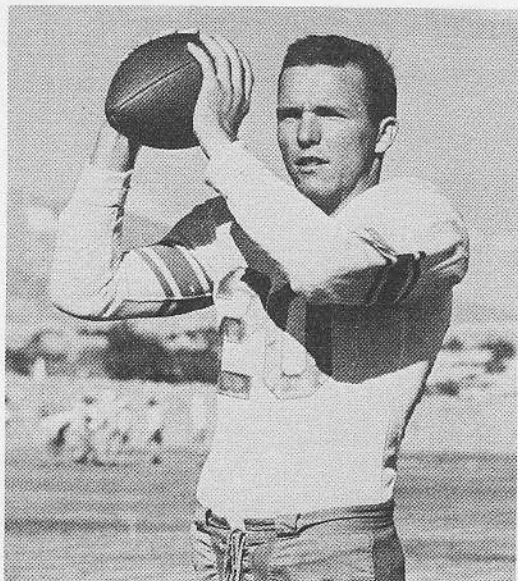
El Paso's "Mr. Handball", Oscar Villareal seems to get better with age. He has been El Paso city handball champion in singles and doubles for the past 26 years and won 19 straight El Paso City "Class A" singles championship before switching into "Master Singles", where he claimed the top honor for the past five straight years.

A native El Pasoan, Villareal was an outstanding track star for El Paso High School and earned letters in football and basketball. He served four years in the U. S. Navy and obtained his engineering degree from UTEP in 1950. He began his fantastic string of city handball championships in 1949 and reached a high point in 1964 when he finished second in the New York Athletic Club's AAU Class A singles. He finished fourth in 1969 in the United States Handball Association within the category of Masters' Singles in a nation-wide competition. He also won numerous titles in doubles competition.

Villareal is today employed by El Paso Water Utilities and still is the most feared man in El Paso handball circles.

DICK SHINAUT

A converted end who as a quarterback was named most valuable player in the Border Conference and led the then Texas Western Miners in some of their greatest football campaigns is Dick Shinaut whose sports prowess led to greatness not only in football but in track and softball as well.

Shinaut had lettered for three years as an end at El Paso High School (where he also won monograms in track) before entering Texas Western in 1950. As a freshman he played end on the Miner frosh team, but Coach Mike Brumbelow in 1951 switched Shinaut to quarterback for the remainder of his college career. He was named an All-Border Conference quarterback in 1952 as well as winning the most valuable player award. He completed 102 of 208 passes for 1,520 yards to rank tenth in the nation. In the 1953 season, despite injuries, he led the Miners to a Sun Bowl berth where the Miners whipped Mississippi Southern. Shinaut was named most valuable player of the game.

He passed up a career in professional football to enter the United States Navy where he achieved the rank of commander. He is today a practicing attorney in El Paso.
