Bill Chesak Living Athlete

Bill Chesak is more than an athlete, he's an El Paso legend. In 1945, his third year as a football letterman at El Paso High School, he was selected to the all-district team for the second year in a row. That same year

he was picked as the most valuable player in the district, and led the state in scoring with 127 points in nine games. That led to Chesak being an all-state selection, along with an invitation to play in the 1945 Texas All Star Game in Corpus Christi. Chesak also lettered in track, and was a district and regional Mile Relay Champion. Harry Stuhldreyer at the University of Wisconsin was Chesak's first college-level coach, guiding his career until Chesak entered the Marines to play for the Miramar Tigercats and the El Toro Marines. After earning All West Coast honors with the Marines, Chesak continued his career with an outstanding record as a running back and punter at Texas Western College. By 1951 his accomplishments had become legendary, and he was drafted by the Green Bay Packers.

Ralph J. Banner Supporter

Supporter
Although he never participated in sports, Ralph Banner is a dedicated sports super-fan. Besides following the Diablos, Miners and many high school teams since 1948, Ralph is known to be generous with his

time and money for the advancement of El Paso sports. He personally sponsored Boys Baseball teams for 28 years and even purchased the P.A. system for Cloudview Park's baseball diamond. Ralph also gave money to support the programs printed for boys baseball. He sponsored the fast pitch softball teams in the Memorial Day Tournament for 2 years and donated considerable time and money to teams going to out-of-town tournaments. Ralph also sponsored a girl's fast pitch team for a year. He was a member of the El Paso Athletic Hall of Fame committee for one year but had to resign because it interferred with his attending high school games. Few people will ever love sports as much as Ralph Banner.



George McCarty Administrator

George McCarty can honestly be called the man who created "The Bear". Not only was he directly responsible for the hiring of Don Haskins as basketball coach for Texas Western College in 1961, he's the man who

invinced Haskins to become a coach in the first place, and who offered Haskins his first coaching position (which Haskins turned down). In 1953, after a five-year run coaching basketball at New Mexico A&M during which he took the Aggies to their first NCAA appearance, McCarty joined Texas Western College as varsity basketball coach, and in 1962, Athletic Director. Under his directorship, UTEP was admitted as a member of the Western Athletic Conference. McCarty was responsible for the hiring of such athletic leaders as Wayne Vandenburg, Bobby Dobbs, Warren Harper and Ted Banks. From his long list of successes at UTEP to his record as Athletic Director at the University of Wyoming from 1973-1980, George McCarty has earned a nation-wide reputation for recognizing top coaching talent and bringing out the best in every area of a sports program.



Seth Joyner Living Athlete

Raised in Spring Valley, New York, where they named a public football field after him, Seth Joyner's community commitment to El Paso prompted former mayor Suzanne Azar to grant him honorary


El Paso citizenship. Joyner adopted El Paso as a second home when he joined the UTEP football program in 1982 as a walk-on. By 1984 and 1985 he was leading the team in tackles. In 1985 he was one of the team's tri-captains and was second-team All-WAC. Joyner was drafted by the Philadelphia Eagles in 1986, and was the third-leading tackler and second highest in sacks in 1987. By 1988 he had recorded his career highs of 136 tackles and 4 interceptions. He was voted Eagle's Most Valuable Player in both 1990 and 1991, and in 1991 was selected to the Pro Bowl, the All-Madden Team, The NFC All-Pro Team, and as the AP's best NFL Linebacker. In his off-season time, Joyner visits El Paso public schools to talk about drugs and education, and volunteers at the House of Cornelius in Fabens.



Ruth Meredith Administrator

Ten years ago, Ruth Meredith was named Director of Athletics for the Ysleta Independent School District. Currently, she is the only woman in Texas to hold this position in a multiple high school district. Ruth is a 24-

year employee of the school district, serving the past 18 years in the Office of Athletics. oversees more than 7,600 students in extracurricular sports from grades 7 through 12. Ruth lettered in basketball, volleyball, tennis and softball at Santa Anna High School in Santa Anna, Texas. She graduated with high honors from UTEP in 1968 and received a Master of Science degree with a 4.0 G.P.A. from UTEP in 1970. During her career, Ruth won the Texas University Interscholastic League State Meritorious Service Award; was a finalist for the El Paso Times Sportswoman of the Year; was named one of The Ten Most Influential Women in Texas Sports by the Austin American Statesman; and won the prestigious 1991 State Award of Merit.



Ross Walker Living Athlete

Ross Walker grew up knowing he was a winner. He won his first major tennis title as a child in England – the 12 and under British Junior C hampion n... succeeded by his titles of 14 and under and 18 and under

British Junior Champion. And his winning streak didn't end when he left England for the U.S. in 1971. From 1972 to 1976 he won respect as a Junior College All American, the National Junior American, the National Junior College Champion, All American (University of Houston), Southwest Conference Single and Double Champion, and Most Valuable Player honors on Houston's top ten university team for three years. He has collected close to 50 national and sectional titles. Ironically, one of the most exciting tournaments in his life was one which he lost. In 1988 Walker played the No. 1 singles position, representing the USA in the Italia Cup 35 and over Men's Tournament in Yugoslavia. He was defeated by West Germany in the finals. Walker is now passing on his legacy to a new generation of winners. He has coached ten National Junior Champions and over 30 nationallyranked juniors.



Gerald Lamar Boykin Posthumous

Even at 6'6" and weighing in at 350 lbs., Gerald Boykin's heart was every bit as big as his stature. Among the many civic organizations and charities he organized, the Magic Touch Cartel did the

most to promote attendance at Miner games. Each year, Gerald would purchase \$10,000 worth of tickets. He would then place these tickets for sale at various businesses throughout the city. In one season, the average attendance rose 12,000 per game. Gerald lettered three years in football and one in basketball while attending high school in San Angelo, Texas. In college, Gerald played center for the Arizona Wildcats from 1951-1954 under head coach Warren Woodson. Soon after, he joined the army and played for the Fort Bliss Falcons, and later graduated from Texas Western College. Boykin actively believed in volunteerism and participated in many volunteer organizations, eventually founding the El Paso Skip Rock Club, an organization to stimulate public interest and enthusiasm for charitable work.
