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Bill Barry Athlete



Bill Barry was a sedentary being until he was 38 years old. Then, on the dare of a friend, he went for a morning run. Within a couple of weeks, he was hooked. About six months later, he started racing and he loved that as much as he did the running itself.

Twenty eight years later, with nearly 49,000 miles of running under his belt, Bill has placed in his age group in over 700 of the 850 races he entered. Over 250 of those were first place, and six of those were first place overall.

In 1985, at the age of 43, Bill decided to try a marathon. Since March of that year Bill has run 100 marathons! He qualified for the Boston Marathon seven times. One year he ran 13 marathons during a 12 month period.

Not satisfied with just running races, Bill also served as either race director or race consultant on over 200 local area races including: The Race for the Cure, The Transmountain Challenge, The El Paso/Juarez International Run, The Del Sol Half-Marathon and The El Paso Marathon. He has mentored and paced many people through their first marathon. He has also trained and coached many of them to their personal bests in the marathon.


Bill was named Sunturian Athlete of the Month in December, 1990, and was inducted into the Senior Games Hall of Fame in 2004. He has also served the community on over 25 boards and commissions over the years.

Bill continues to run and compete. He placed in all ten of his 2008 races. Bill also continues to set running goals. In 1994 he had run enough miles to circle the earth—he will probably complete his second "lap" this year! Bill also has his eye on completing his 1000th race; which he estimates he'll do that in about four years!

Ray Mickens Athlete



Ray Mickens has taken his passion for football from the school yards of El Paso's northeast, to the fields of Texas A&M University, and to the stadiums of the National Football League. While attending Andress High School, he was a Division 1-5A all-state running back in 1990-91. This was the year that Andress defeated Midland Lee twice. Ray also lettered in basketball and track for the Golden Eagles.

At Texas A&M University, Ray continued to excel on the football field as one of the country's top coverage cornerbacks, making All-American and All-Southwest Conference in both his junior and senior years. During his career, he had 162 tackles and nine interceptions. As one of the top punt returners in the country, he had 24 returns for 281 yards. Ray was also a sprinter on the track team.


Ray was drafted by the New York Jets in the 3rd round of the 1996 NFL Draft. He played for New York from 1996-2004. During that time he only sat out two games in eight seasons. In 2005, Ray signed a one-year contract with the Cleveland Browns. The following year, he signed with the New England Patriots and was a prominent player in New England's run toward the division championship against the Indianapolis Colts. Ray became a free agent in 2007.

Ray has realized his childhood

dreams and is proud of his El Paso roots. This pride inspired him to form The Champions Fund, a nonprofit organization established as a way of giving back to the community that inspired him reach for the stars. For the past five years, Ray has invited his NFL friends to visit El Paso and encourage area youth to reach for their dreams. Events such as the annual Football Camp, the Basketball Tournament, and the citywide Reading Contest have touched countless of young lives. Ray maintains close ties with El Paso. The community still holds a huge part of Ray's heart and he still calls El Paso home.

Bufe Morrison Athlete



Bufe Morrison started his quest for competition in 1951 at Roger Brown Field in the first Little League season. At St. Joseph Elementary, he continued in three sports under the leadership of Lydia Sierra. Here he won his first award as the MVP in 1953. Bufe also played three sports at Cathedral HS. The baseball team went to the Catholic State Tournament in 1957. Bufe continues his baseball career at Texas Western where he played for three years under Andy Cohen. His freshmen year, he was honored as 2nd team All-American as a utility player.

Altogether Bufe played baseball for 40 years. He won 24 All-Star or MVP awards and had a lifetime average of .350. In 1990, he was inducted into the El Paso Baseball Hall of Fame and then inducted into the International Baseball Tournament Hall in 1991.

Bufe also played 15 years of fast-pitch softball winning several All-Star awards and compiling a .351 average. In 1987, he was inducted into the El Paso Softball Hall of Fame.


At the age of 50, Bufe competed in his first senior track meet and got hooked. Nineteen years later, he and his wife, Mary, have been to 15 states and 161 senior games competitions. Bufe won the Outstanding Athlete Award eight times in El Paso and once in Lubbock during that time. He competes in track, swimming, bowling, tennis, race walking and almost all senior games events except golf. His medal count to date is 2,490. His best event is the javelin. In 1994, Bufe was inducted into the El Paso Senior Games Hall of Fame. In 2001, he was inducted into the Texas Senior games Hall of Fame. The City of El Paso proclaimed that October 30, 2001 was Bufe Morrison Day.

Bufe worked for 27 years for El Paso ISD as a physical education teacher including 10 years of coaching. His teams at Hughey Elementary won many track meets.

Bufe has been married to Mary for 45 years. They have three sons. Despite some health problems, He is still active in the Senior games and lives to compete.

Ron Leiman came to El Paso in 1978 based on a call David Williams made to Jeep Gutierrez. Ron coached at Bassett JHS for a year and then at Parkland HS for two years. After two years at the University of Oregon, he returned to El Paso and was head girls track coach from 1985-88 at Hanks HS.

In 1989, Ron became the athletic supervisor for Ysleta ISD. The director, Ruth Meredith, encouraged him to be highly visible and to become involved in local, state and national athletic organizations. Ron served as the director of the TIWA State Wrestling Tournament in 1993 and of multiple 2AAAAA competitions during his nine years at YISD.

In 1998, Ron became the athletic director for Socorro ISD. Many innovations were implemented due to SISD staff

teamwork including: SISD Athletics Web Page in 1999-2000, Finish Lynx fully automatic timing system for track, Daktronics wrestling scoreboards. Daktronics swimming timing system and scoreboard for the SISD Aquatics Center, installation of an artificial grass field and a Thor Guard Lightning Detector at the SISD Student Activities Complex (SAC). Innovative facilities were built including the locker room pod, main gym and weight/wrestling room at El Dorado High School. Program enhancements included increased funding for equipment, uniforms, varsity team travel and coaches pay.

Ron was involved with state and national organizations serving as a state board member for the Texas High School Athletic Director's Association

arrival. Existing facilities have been renovated, and sparkling new buildings have taken shape. Additions to UTEP's athletic kingdom in recent years include the Larry K. Durham Sports Center, the Helen of Troy Softball Complex and, coming in 2009, the Foster-Stevens Basketball Complex.

UTEP set school records for football attendance in 2005. The men's basketball team has played before 18 sellout crowds of 12,000 since 2004, and women's basketball had five audiences of 5,000-plus fans in 2007-08.

Stull is in his second go-around at UTEP after serving as the Miners' football coach from 1986-88. He directed the Miners to 21 victories in three seasons, including an Independence Bowl (THSADA) in 2001 and 2002, on the Texas faculty for LTC, and on the National Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association (NIAAA) Credentials Committee from 2003-2006. Ron became the first area AD to earn the NIAAA Certified Ma Athletic Administrator (CMArr) designation in 2006.

Ron retired at the end of 2006 after nine years at SISD. He has served as the president of the El Paso Athletic Hall of Fame in 2007 and 2008. Ron is originally from Ft. Wayne, Indiana and is married to Rosemary (Navarro). He is most appreciative of the support of Norm Phillips and hall members for this tremendous honor.

A native of Davenport, Iowa, Stull holds bachelor's and master's degrees from Kansas State, where he was a three-year letterman and captained the Wildcats in 1967. He was a member of the coaching staffs at Kansas State, Kent State and Washington before landing his first head coaching assignment at UTEP. Stull also returne Washington as associate athlened director for development prior to taking the helm of the Miner athletic program.

Stull and his wife, Kim, have a daughter, Shannon and a son, Kevin.

Bob Haynsworth Administrator



Bob Haynsworth has been one of the greatest supporters of sports in the history of El Paso. Haynsworth brought Little League Baseball to El Paso in the 1950's. Then, in the 1960's, he helped save El Paso's struggling professional baseball team from extinction, ran the Sunland Park Racetrack as general manager for four years and founded the New Mexico Horse Breeder's Association.

Bob also served as the president of the Sun Carnival Association, the University of Texas at El Paso Touchdown Club and the YMCA. Additionally, he served on various civic organizations including the Chamber of Commerce.

The founding of the Little League has given thousands upon thousands of young boys an opportunity they never had before to enjoy supervised baseball. Although segregation was still in effect in 1950, Haynsworth made sure the program would be available to all youths. Nolan Richardson, who later became an outstanding athlete and coach, was one of the first beneficiaries of that rule.

As president of the Sun Carnival Association, Haynsworth traveled to New York to make the first contact with a national television network to carry the football game. This move pushed the Sun Bowl to greater national prestige and exposure. He also helped initiate the first Sun Carnival Basketball Classic.

During his tenure as general manager of Sunland Park Racetrack, Haynsworth introduced night horse racing to the El Paso area and used his well-honed political skills to gain an access road to the track off of Interstate 10. The road was named Sunland Park Drive. Soon businesses in the area starting using the name Sunland Park and the name became a fixture in the consciousness of El Pasoans.

Induction into the El Paso Athletic Hall of Fame this year is the latest, and one his most cherished, awards. He has received many other athletic and civic honors, including induction info the El Paso Baseball Hall of Fam



Dawn Hearn was a three sport athlete at Centerville High School; excelling in softball as a three time 1st team all conference 3rd baseman. She went on to Iowa State University to study Fishery and Wildlife Biology initially, but missed being involved in athletics. She became a student athletic trainer at ISU, covering Women's Basketball, Women's Track and Field, and Football.

In December 1985, she graduated from ISU with a Bachelor's Degree in Physical Education with Minors in Athletic Training and Coaching. Upon passing the national exam, she became a Certified Athletic Trainer in April 1986. Hearn attended Graduate School at Ohio University, where her graduate assistantship consisted of covering Jackson High School athletics. She graduated in June 1987, with a Master's of Science Degree in Physical Education with an emphasis in Athletic Training, and spent two summers with the US Volleyball Association.

In the fall of 1987, Dawn accepted a position with the American Physical Rehabilitation Network in Toledo, Ohio, where she covered Sylvania Southview High School, and also worked in the Physical Therapy Department at St. Luke's Hospital. After only 10 months in this position, Hearn knew her true passion was to work at the collegiate level. She spent one more summer with the USVBA and was hired by David Binder, Fellow El Paso Athletic Hall of Famer, as his Assistant at UTEP, in August 1988.

In April 1995, David Binder was lured away to UNM and Hearn was promoted to Head Athletic Trainer at UTEP. At that time, she was only the 3rd female to be a Head Athletic Trainer of a Division 1A Athletic Training Program, and the 2nd in charge of Football. Hearn supervises four full-time Assistants, five Graduate Assistants, and approximately 15 Undergraduate Students at UTEP. She has had close to 50 students graduate under her supervision, and now working as athletic trainers.

Dawn Hearn loved spending time during the summer months at Elephant Butt Lake on her boat with her two dogs (her kids), fishing, skiing and camping.

Joel Richard Kaplowitz was born on December 4, 1945 in Brooklyn, New York, and moved to El Paso with his family in 1978. Joel began his broadcast career with KROD 600 in 1995, served as a volunteer off-ice official for the El Paso Buzzards from 1996-2002, and then joined the Time Warner Cable family in 2002.

During his time with KROD 600, Joel spent seven years as one of their high school football reporters for the Football Friday Night radio show. With the Buzzards, Joel worked as a goal judge and penalty box official.

In 2002, Joel joined Time Warner Cable as play-by-play announcer for their High School Game of the Week. In addition,

along with Wayne Thornton, he co-hosted the "El Paso Sports Showcase," a one-hour weekly sports show featuring commentary and interviews with local sports personalities. During that time, he served as a presenter for numerous "High School Banquet of the Stars," which honored exceptional prep athletes. Joel worked for Time Warner until his untimely death on April 30, 2004. In June 2005, El Paso Parks and Recreation and Time Warner honored Joel by sponsoring a Fun Walk in his memory at Album Park, with over 300 walkers joining his family in the event.

His devotion to Miner basketball led to the establishment of the Joel Kaplowitz Endowment

Fund. The fund was created in July 2005 to benefit student athletes on the UTEP Men's basketball team. His love for the Miners was surpassed only by his love for his wife, Ann. He never missed a home game, except on their wedding anniversary.

Joel was a player, a fan, a coach, a teacher, and a commentator. He gave of himself, and was rewarded with lasting friendships. Of all his sports endeavors, nothing meant as much to him as his career in sports broadcasting.
