

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Steve Haskins Athlete



Steve Haskins has lived in El Paso since he was two years old when his parents. Don and Mary Haskins moved here for his father to take over as the Head Basketball Coach for UTEP. He is married (Carmen) and has two children John-Paul (10/28/89) and Cameron (3/29/93). His father had a strong influence on him both personally and About his professionally. father, Steve said "He not only showed his support for my golf and me personally, but taught me life lessons that helped me give back to the community and succeed in becoming a professional athlete."

Steve played golf for

Coronado High School where he was named to the All District Team from 1974-77 and was Regional Champion in 1976. At New Mexico State University he was the 1981 Missouri Valley Champion and All American Honorable Mention. He is a former El Paso City Amateur Golf Champion.

Steve turned pro in 1984 and was a member of the Nationwide Tour from 1990 to 2005 where he posted 45 Top Ten finishes and made 193 cuts. He participated in two U.S. Open Championships and had 20 career wins including, The New Mexico Open (1986 and 1987), 1989 Bogey Hills Invitational, 1991 Ben Hogan New England Classic, 2000 Panama Open and the 2001 Ozark Open. Steve's overall career earnings total \$1.2 million including Nationwide Tour Earnings of \$776,052, which ranks 11th all-time.

Steve participates in various community and charitable events including the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, American Diabetes Association, Don Haskins Sports Fund and other local charities.

Lara Jackson Athlete



El Paso's Lara Jackson started competitive swimming as a 10year-old in summer league. After that first summer, Coach Melissa Lomeli encouraged Lara to continue on her year round club team. Lara enjoyed success participating in Texas Age Group Swimming. During high school, Lara was a member of the Ft Bliss Barracudas and worked closely with Coach Wright Stanton III. Lara swam for Eastwood High School her freshman year and transferred to Chapin High School her sophomore year. At the State Meet in Austin, she was runner


up in the 100 yd breast her junior year and won the 100 yd fly her senior year. She was the Texas 4A state champion junior and senior years in the 50 yd free. She became a five time high school All-American.

For college, Lara found a good match in the University of Arizona and was invited to walk onto the team. During Lara's four years at Arizona, she was a fourteen time college All-American; a member of seven NCAA and American record breaking relay teams; a member of the 2008 NCAA national championship team; and a two time individual NCAA champion. She is a former American record holder in the 50 meter freestyle and is currently the NCAA and American record holder in the 50 yd freestyle.

Lara's other interests include riding her marc, Calypso and listening to The Offspring, Incubus, Sublime and 80's retro rock music. Lara is the daughter of Keith and Martina Jackson of El Paso. Lara has an older sister, Carly Rose Jackson, who is currently a journalism student in Boston.

Joe Morales Athlete



Many people believe Joe was born with a ball and glove in his hands. At Jefferson High School, he played on two district championship teams in basketball and on three baseball playoff teams. He was selected All District and All City in both sports. He then played baseball at UTEP and was on the last team in 1985.


Joe then switched his career to fast-pitch softball. He spent 25 years playing for club teams: All Sports Club, Houston 9 and Broken Bow Travelers. He was named Most Valuable Player in the Latin American Tournament in 1984, 1985, 1987 and 2007. While playing with Broken Bow, the team won three International Softball Congress World Championships (2001, 2004 & 2005) and he was selected All World in 1999 and 2002.

His most memorable experience was in 2001, when he became the first El Pasoan selected to be a member of the United States National Team. He traveled with the team for four years. He earned a silver medal at the Pan American Games in the Dominican Republic. He earned a gold medal at the Pan American qualifying tournament in Guatemala City. Standing on the podium receiving his gold medal while the National Anthem was playing was his most motivational experience – the crowning glory of many years of hard work.

One of his most rewarding accomplishments in his life is being married to Elsa for 18 years. His beautiful daughter Alexia has become the greatest pleasure in his life. Joe is the proud son of Beatrice and Jose Morales.

Bruce Reichman Coach



Bruce Reichman was raised in Miami Beach, Florida, and graduated from The University of Texas El Paso (UTEP). Reichman is a charter faculty member of Del Valle High School (1987) and the only men's soccer coach since its inception twenty two years ago. He is the department head for the Health and Physical Education department. Bruce holds licenses from the United States Soccer Federation and the National Soccer Coaches Association of America.

Coach Reichman has earned numerous honors at Del Valle including Who's Who of American Teachers and the El Paso Times Coach of the Year in 1992, 1998, 1999, 2004, 2005, and 2008. He is also the 2008 National Federation of High Schools State Coach of the Year and Southwest Sectional Coach of the Year (Arkansas, Colorado, New Mexico, Oklahoma, and Texas). Coach Reichman was also selected as the 2008 UIL Texas State Soccer Coach of the Year.

Coach Reichman ranks third in the State of Texas amongst active coaches with the most wins and he ranks first all-time in the City of El Paso with 415 career wins which includes 65 titles: fifteen District Championships, eight Bi-District Championships, twelve Area Championships, six Sectional Championships, seven Quarter Final Championships, six Sweet 16 Championships, four Elite Eight Championships, four Final Four Appearances and two State Championships (2005 and 2008).

After high school graduation, Bruce's players have competed for 16 different colleges and universities. One DVHS alumnus is playing for the US National Indoor Team. Eleven players have moved on to professional soccer. Bruce has three children; Adrian, Alan and Alexis.

Flo Valdez Coach



Flo Valdez is in her 13th year at Franklin High School where her volleyball teams have never missed the playoffs and have compiled a 354-84 record. Under her tutelage, the Cougars have won eleven consecutive district championships, four bidistrict titles and two area championships (2003 & 2004). From 1999-2001, her varsity softball teams won three district championships, two area championships and made it to the Sweet Sixteen in 2001. The El Paso Times has named her Volleyball Coach of the Year four times (1999, 2004, 2006 & 2008) and Softball Coach of the Year in 2001.

Flo has served on the Board of Directors for the National Federation High School Coaches Association and as its president in 1998. She represented high school coaches on the USA Women's Basketball Selection Committee in 1996. She has served on national committees for NFCA Publications, Sportsmanship, Ethics and Integrity; and, NFHS Strategic Planning. At the state level, Flo has been on the Board of Directors for the Texas Girls Coaches Association. She has also served as the president of the El Paso Coaches Association.


In 1998, Flo was the first

woman inducted into the New Mexico High School Coaches Hall of Honor. In 2001 she was named National Volleyball Coach of the Year by the National Federation High School Coaches Association.

Flo has been an educator and coach for 42 years and has witnessed the evolvement of athletic opportunities for girls from practices on the blacktop to year round programs. Her career is one that she would not trade for anything.

Paul Strelzin Supporter



He's affectionately known as "The Mouth" and "The Strelz." For decades, Paul Strelzin's booming voice has reverberated through sports stadiums and arenas throughout El Paso. It's not an exaggeration to say that Paul has been "part of" more different sporting teams and events than any El Pasoan ever. The Strelz is best known for being the public address announcer of Diablos baseball and UTEP football and basketball. Strelzin's incessant. "We want a hit, we want a hit," and other baseball rants inspired hundreds of thousands of fans at the old Dudley Dome. His boisterous "MMMMMMiner

ball remains a staple employed by subsequent announcers at UTEP basketball games.

The Strelz has done public address announcing for virtually every spectator sport in El Paso. The list includes the Sun Bowl game, UTEP track and field, championship boxing and karate, volleyball, auto and foot racing events, ice hockey, soccer, arena football and high school sports. His announcing exploits brought him national attention in National Geographic, books and network television.

Paul spent nearly 30 years as a teacher, coach and school administrator in El Paso. A civil

rights crusader for students while principal at Bowie High School, Strelzin landed on the front page of the Wall Street Journal.

Strelzin came to El Paso from Brooklyn to visit a friend in 1966. He spotted a beautiful girl driving on Mesa Street and followed his future wife Darlyne to her family's nightclub in Juarez. They were married two years later and now have three daughters, two sons-in-law and three beautiful grandchildren. "The Strelz" now hosts a popular daily radio program.

Perry Huddleston Official



Perry Huddleson was born in York, South Carolina in 1932. He participated in football, basketball and baseball at York High School. Perry entered the Army in 1950 where he played local and All Army levels in multiple sports. He retired from the Army as an E-7 22 years later.

Perry arrived in El Paso in 1958. He began his baseball officiating career under the tutelage of Yvan Rechy, the president of the El Paso Umpires Association. Since then, Perry has officiated over 6,000 games. He has worked at many levels including the Texas League (AA), collegiate and state tournaments in Texas and New Mexico. He served as the Umpire in Chief of Connie Mack B a s e b a 1 1 N a t i o n a 1 Championship Tournaments and of many El Paso City Baseball and Softball Tournaments. Perry has served as the President of the El Paso Umpires Association and District Director of the Texas State Baseball Association for the past 29 years.

Perry has also officiated basketball and is currently a football referee. Perry graduated from UTEP and taught in the Ysleta Independent School District for 27 years. Perry has worked and volunteered with the City of El Paso Parks and Recreation. He has had the pleasure of working with supervisors: Paula Powell, Ginger Elliott, Raul Martinez and others over the years. He received the department's distinguished Lifetime Achievement Award for 50 years of service.

Perry was inducted into the El Paso Baseball Hall of Fame along with many of his mentors. He is appreciative of all of the people who have made his induction a reality.

Lionel "Leo" Forti Posthumous



Lionel "Leo" Forti devoted his life to bringing the joy of sports to thousands of people. When he was just twelve years old, he tried out for an amateur baseball team. He was cut. He went home in tears. "Why don't you form your team?" his father asked. The youngster lit up like a light bulb. He went out and found young men as eager as he to join a team. In fact he found so many, he formed a second team, then a third, and soon he had an entire baseball league going.

Word spread throughout the Southwest. People who loved others sports came to him for help. Having known rejection, he never turned anyone down. He formed, coached and sponsored amateur basketball teams and sandlot football teams in addition to baseball teams. When boxers came to him, he helped them too by managing some of the finest boxers in the Golden Gloves.

During the middle of the last century, it seemed like everyone in El Paso and the surrounding area was playing in some sport under his wing. Some of his teams were outstanding. His baseball team won the Southwest Semi-pro Tournament by beating Ft. Bliss, which was loaded with professional players.

It was his contributions to helping others that made Leo Forti, who passed away last year at the age of 91, one of the most beloved figures in the history of El Paso sports. His wife, Berta, and son, Lionel Jr., preceded him in death. His daughter, Diana, is married to Joe Loera. Anthony Lee Loera will represent his great-grandfather at the induction.
