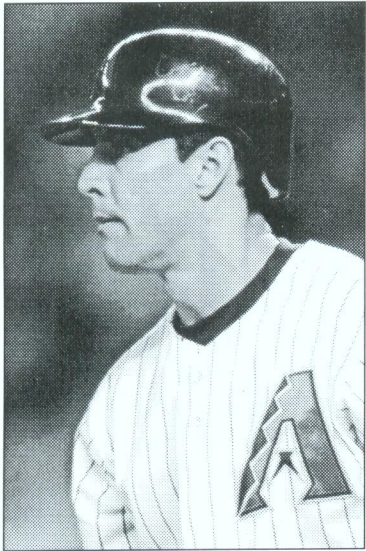

Alan Zinter

Athlete



Alan Zinter was the El Paso City Player of the Year in 1986. That year he hit .505 for the Hanks Knights and led the State with 15 HRs and 51 RBIs. He was named All District and All City for four consecutive years (freshman through senior). Alan was ranked by Baseball America as the 24th top position player in the nation in 1986.

Alan tied the University of Arizona team record with 18 HRs and led the Pac-10 Conference in Hrs and 81 RBIs his junior year (1989). He was named to the NCAA, Baseball America, Sporting

News and ABCA All-American teams; as well as being selected as the Pac-10 Conference Co-Player of the Year and a finalist for the 1989 Golden Spikes Award. During his Arizona career, he played in 162 Games with 211 Hits, 29 HRs, 172 RBIs and compiled a .336 B/A.

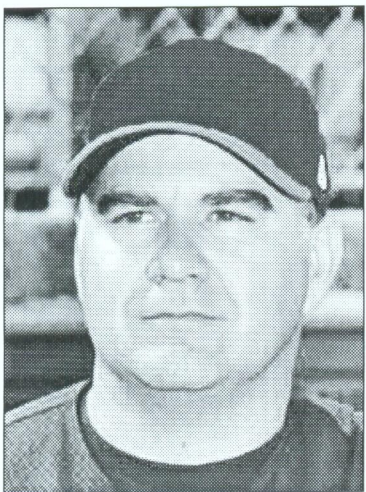
He was drafted in the 1st Round (24th overall) by the New York Mets in the 1989 MLB Draft. Alan played 19 years (1989-2007) of professional baseball in seven organizations including one year in Japan. Over his pro career, he played in 1,965

games with 1574 Hits, 279 HRs, 1,022 RBIs and compiled a .256 B/A. He made his major league debut with the Astros in 2002 and played with the Diamondbacks in 2004. His first major league hit was a home run in Cincinnati. Upon retirement in 2008, Alan became a hitting coach in the Arizona Diamondbacks' minor league system.

Butch Henry

Athlete



Butch Henry is entering his 5th season as manager of the El Paso Diablos. He is a native of El Paso and graduated from Eastwood High School. While a Trooper, Henry teamed with fellow El Paso Athletic Hall of Fame pitcher Frank Castillo to form the most dominant left and right handed pitching combination in El Paso high school baseball history. Henry bypassed a scholarship offer from the Texas Longhorns to enter the MLB draft in 1987 and was drafted by the Cincinnati

Reds. He made his major league debut five years later with the Houston Astros in 1992. He also played for the Montreal Expos, Colorado Rockies, Boston Red Sox, and the Seattle Mariners. During his career, Henry was 33-33, with a 3.89 ERA, while throwing 621 innings.

After retirement in 2003, Henry went on to coach the Sarasota Reds and the Billings Mustangs. In 2006, he was named manager of his hometown team, the El Paso Diablos. Henry led the Diablos

to its first playoff berth since 2000 and was awarded Manager of the year by the American Association of Independent Professional Baseball.

Butch Henry still lives in El Paso with his wife Mary, son BJ, and daughters Alisha and Erin.

Sara Walker Scott

Athlete



Sara Walker started playing tennis when she was three years old and by seven, she competed in her first tournament. She was undefeated in every Southwest Juniors Tournament, winning 56 straight tournaments from age 12 through 18. Sara was also the only junior player to win four straight Fiesta Bowl National Junior Titles (1996-1999). She represented the United States at the U.S. Open Junior Championships reaching the quarterfinals, and at the Italian Open. Sara ended her Juniors career ranked #3 nationally in the Girls 18's and by winning the National 18 and

Under Sportsmanship Award.

Sara also played for Franklin HS as a 9th and 10th grader winning the UIL State Singles Championship in 1996 and 1997.

She attended UCLA on a full tennis scholarship. She was a four-time All American in singles and doubles, four-time All Pac-10 player and a four-time member of the NCAA travelling team. Sara's highest ranking in college was # 1 in singles and # 2 in doubles. Her UCLA tennis career ended with her winning the National Collegiate Sportsmanship Award.

Sara won two pro tennis singles titles during her playing career. She won the USTA Satellite Tournament of El Paso and of Edmond, Oklahoma.

Sara now teaches tennis in Santa Barbara, California, while enjoying her role as wife to her husband Ben and mother to her beautiful daughter, Isabella. Sara is a third generation inductee following her grandfather, Bobby Goldfarb; and father, Ross Walker.

Tom Work Coach



Tom Work grew up in northeast El Paso and attended Irvin High School. He was inspired by coaches Ralph Work (his father) and Neil Billingsley to pursue a career which would span the next four decades. He received his Bachelor's Degrees from the University of Texas (with Honors) in 1976 and 1977; followed by his Master's Degree from UTEP in 1985. He would spend his entire career working for the Ysleta I.S.D. with stints at Bel Air HS (1977-1984) and at Riverside HS (1985-2006). He worked for Hall of Fame coaches Bob Savage (BAHS) and Lou James (RHS) before becoming the head football coach at

Riverside in 1992.

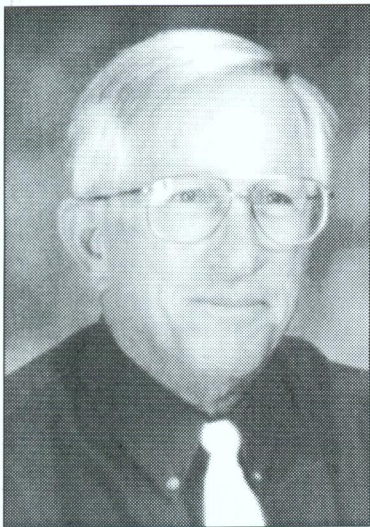
The Rangers had a 134-38-2 record (78% winning percentage) during Tom's tenure. During that time, the Rangers won nine District Championships, 10 Bi-District Championships (eight consecutive) and back-to-back Area Championships. Tom's teams compiled four perfect 10-0 regular seasons and 46 consecutive district wins. The Rangers also played a regional semifinal game in Texas Stadium. The Rangers had never won a championship in their 20 years prior to Tom's tenure.

Tom was named the El Paso Times Coach of the Year three times (1993, 2003, 2004). He is very proud that nine of his assistants have gone on to become head coaches and that 24 of his former players have chosen the coaching profession. He also is proud that he founded a Fellowship of Christian Athletes Chapter at Riverside.

Tom and his lovely wife, Emily, are the proud parents of Ben, Desiree and Aimee.

Ben Brooks, Jr. Coach



Benny Brooks is a humble man, dedicated husband and father, and the versatile track coach for Bowie High School. Brooks, 72, coached at Cathedral, Canutillo, St. Joseph's Elementary, Jefferson and Bowie High Schools and once again at Jefferson. A native of Waleetka, Oklahoma, and El Paso resident since 1948, he graduated from Cathedral (1955) and UTEP (1971).

Unlike Bum Phillips who retired from football and never looked back, Benny retired in 1988 but said he loved "being around kids," so he taught physical education at Omar

Bradley Elementary, coached at NMSU (1989-1991), was principal at St. Patrick's and presently assists his son, Edward, with track, and Alfredo Trejo, with cross country at Jefferson HS.

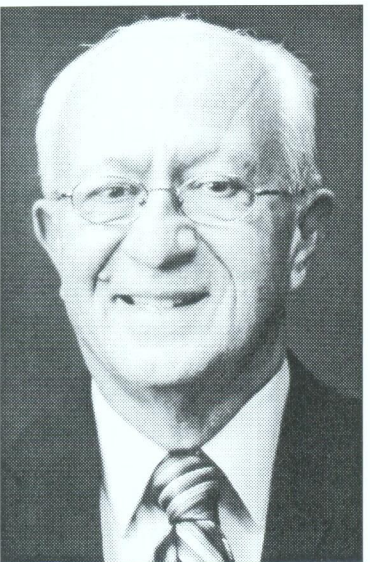
Collectively, Benny coached two state cross country championship teams at Bowie HS (Boys in 1979 and Girls in 1986), 39 years overall, one All American Girls Team (1986), a state semifinalist team (1978), two state bronze medal teams (1973 and 1981), seven regional and 12 district championships and 10 parochial winners. Former runners Antonio

Cordero, Leslie Mendez, Isidro Ramirez and Alfredo Trejo credit Benny for much of their success.

Benny earned three El Paso Times Coach of the Year awards (1979, 1983, 1987). At home, he and his beloved wife, the late Rosemary Brooks, raised an exemplary family in more than 50 years together. Of their eight children (Debbie, Stephanie Olenski, Tracy Christine Fernandez, Mary Beth Burciaga, Margaret Greehey, Julia Duncan, Benny Jr. and Edward), six are educators.

Benny was nominated by his longtime friend, Julio Lujan.

Ernest Barnard Polk Supporter



Barnard is an avid sports fan, and a special supporter of the UTEP Miners! He has participated in basketball, baseball, softball, volleyball and bowling. Barnard graduated from Austin High School in 1966 as Valedictorian. He graduated from UTEP in 1977 with a degree in Pre-Law and Sociology. At UTEP, Barnard was a member of the Student Government Association, completed an internship in the County Attorney's Office and was on the Dean's List.

Barnard worked in banking, as the director of the Center for Ecumenical Aid to Transients

and as a pastoral assistant. He cared for his mother Sue Polk for eight years and retired in 2003. In 2005, he married Lynn Lantow Polk.

Barnard has always been involved in some kind of community service including Jaycees and Sertoma. Currently, he is a member of the UTEP Heritage Commission, the Miner Athletic Club and the Miner Fan Club. He serves as an elder in the First Christian Church.

Barnard has served as president, vice president, secretary, historian and parliamentarian of the El Paso

Athletic Hall of Fame over the past 22 years. He has had perfect attendance for all meetings and banquets since 1989. He has coordinated meetings at the First Christian Church since 1995. Since 2000, he has coordinated EPAHoF archive materials with the El Paso County Historical Society.

Barnard has been a servant to El Paso in many ways during his lifetime, but he believes one of his highest accomplishments is becoming a member of the distinguished El Paso Athletic Hall of Fame.

Mona Loper
Posthumous



Mona Loper, the grand lady of bowling in El Paso, was born on October 12, 1912 in Bisbee, Arizona. Her lifelong love of sports began while attending semi-pro baseball games with her father. Over the next 92 years, she graced this earth as a distinguished educator, bowler and sports enthusiast. From humble beginnings, she graduated from Hotel Dieu School of Nursing and began her professional career as a registered nurse at El Paso High School. In 1957, she earned a B.S. from Texas Christian University. She started teaching at Texas Western College

(UTEP) in the Department of Health and Physical Education. She retired as an associate professor at the age of 82.

Mona will be most remembered as an ambassador for and for her love of the sport of bowling. Over 70 years of her life were spent in bowling and numerous phases of improving and expanding the sport. Some of her major accomplishments were serving as president of the El Paso Women's Bowling Association from 1969-2006 and being a delegate to the Women's International Bowling Congress Committee for 36 years. Along this journey, she

was elected to the El Paso Women's Bowling Hall of Fame in 1968 and to the Texas Women's Bowling Association Hall of Fame in 1998.

In 1994, Mona developed macular degeneration and was declared legally blind. With a keen wit and persistent smile, she continued to bowl in her league twice a week and when not bowling was glued to the sports programs on her radio 24/7. She died in 2006, but her mark on the El Paso bowling community will be forever remembered.
