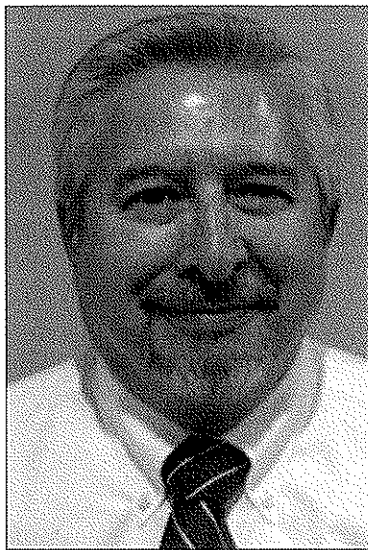

Humberto "Beto" Bautista

Athlete



Beto is one of three children born and raised in El Paso by Humberto and Jo Ann Bautista. He attended Austin High School where he played varsity basketball his junior and senior years, making the All-District team his senior year in 1970. He received athletic scholarship offers from Sul Ross and UTEP and made the decision to stay in town and play for the Miners and Don Haskins. During his playing career at UTEP, Beto made the All-Academic Western Athletic Conference team as a sophomore; as a junior, he

was named to the all-tournament team at the Bayou Classic in Lafayette, Louisiana and was Honorable Mention Wester Athletic Conference; and as a senior, served as a tri-captain of the team. In 1973, Beto played for the Mexican National Team in the World Games held in Moscow, Russia.

Beto graduated from UTEP in 1974 with a Bachelor of Science Degree and stayed on to get his Masters degree in Civil Engineering. During that time, he served as the freshman coach and graduate assistant to Don Haskins.

He has spent half of his professional career in the private sector working in the land development business in the Houston area and the other half working for the City of Houston. He currently serves as an Assistant Director for the General Services Department at the City and is one of three persons designated with the title City Engineer.

Beto and his wife, Rebecca, have been married since 1987. They raised two sons, Ryan and Matthew Walker. They now have four beautiful granddaughters.

Carilyn Johnson

Athlete



Carilyn Johnson is a mom, ultrarunner and coach. Ultrarunning encompasses those distances that are greater than the marathon – that is, further than 26.2 miles. Carilyn prefers to run races that are further than 100 miles, placing in almost every ultramarathon she has competed in from the start of her career, and has excelled at the international level in races that are run for 24 hours straight.

As a two-time member of the USA 24-Hour Run Team, Carilyn has competed in Two

World Championships, and helped the United States win a Silver Medal in Bergamo, Italy in 2009. Most recently, she won the Desert Solstice Elite Invitational 24-Hour by beating all women AND men with 130.92 miles. That's equivalent to running from El Paso to Ruidoso. This ranks her fifth in the US this year. She is hoping to be named to the US National Team for a third year, and compete in Poland as a part of Team USA 24-Hour in the fall.

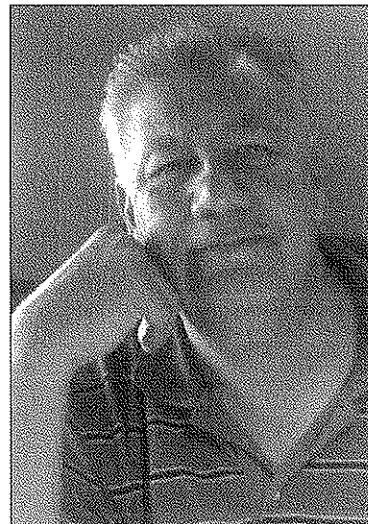
Carilyn runs up to 25 miles a day, weight trains, and swims

for an hour, all while taking care of her two children, Grant and Spencer. Carilyn's family acts as her crew on her many long races, traveling with her around the world.

Rafael Palomar

Athlete



Born July 19, 1951 in Ciudad Juarez, Rafael is the oldest of four children of Rafael Palomar Sr. and Delfina Acosta. Raised in El Paso along with his siblings Josefina, Manuelita and Miguel, Rafael came from very humble beginnings in the Segundo Barrio. He attended Ysleta High School, "Pride of the Lower Valley" where his basketball career began. As an Indian, he once grabbed 41 rebounds in a game, a state record. Rafael was blessed to have the opportunity to attend Texas Tech, Twin Falls Idaho College and Cameron University in Oklahoma.

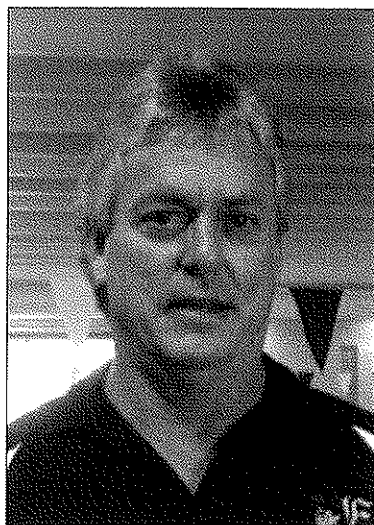
He was coached and mentored by extraordinary coaches such as Gordon Moore, Jerry Hale, Gene Iba and Gerald Myers. Later came the honor of playing professionally in Mexico and Puerto Rico. He played in the World University Games in 1973. In 1974 he was drafted by the Milwaukee Bucks and San Antonio Spurs. Rafael represented Mexico in the 1976 Olympic Games in Montreal. He played in the Inter-Continental Cup of Nations in 1977 and 1979, Central American Games in 1977 and 1979, Pre-Olympic Games in 1972, 1976 and 1980,

Pan-American Games 1975, 1979 and 1983. More recently, in 1999, Rafael was inducted into the National Hispanic Basketball Hall of Fame in San Antonio. In 2008, Rafael entered the Ciudad Juarez, Mexico Athletic Hall of Fame.

Although he had a great and successful career, nothing compares to the blessing of sharing his life with Patricia, his wife of 36 years, 3 beautiful daughters, Kayla, Zaira and Siria and 10 grandchildren. "Nothing has given me more rewards and happiness than being a father to my children."

Steven Flato

Coach



Steve Flato grew up in a swimming family. A native El Pasoan, Steve graduated from Eastwood High School and attended Drury College where he was a two-time Collegiate All-American and was a member of the Panther's first National Championship team.

After college, Steve was hired as the Head Coach of the Eastwood High School Swim Team in 1982. He immediately built both a Boys and Girls program that has dominated the sport. Eastwood Boys' teams have collected 30 straight District Championships while the Girls' teams have won 25 or

30 titles. At the Regional level Eastwood boys have won 14 Region I Championships while his girls claimed 2 Region I titles.

Equally successful at the state level, where Texas swimming is ranked as one of the fastest in the nation, Flato's Boys team have collected top 5 finishes six times since 1996. His 1997, 1998 and 2000 Boys teams were top ten nationally ranked with his 1998 200-Freestyle relay team crowned National Champions.

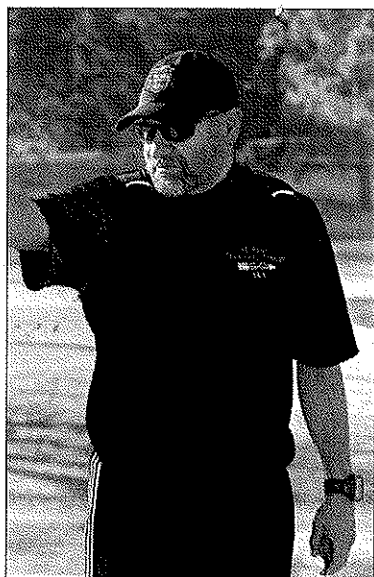
In 1974, Steve's late sister, Connie Flato, became the first athlete from El Paso to achieve

High School All-American. Since then, seventy-eight of Steve's swimmers have earned All-American status and 14 have been named Academic All-American.

In his spare time, Coach Flato founded the Desert Sharks Swim Club in 1988. Under his direction, over 50 swimmers from this organization have earned scholarships to continue swimming in college. He holds a level 5 coaching certification from the American Swimming Coaches Association which less than 5% of all coaches ever achieve.

Felix Hinojosa

Coach



In 12 seasons at the helm of the El Paso Community College Cross Country / Half Marathon program, head coach Felix Hinojosa has continuously led the women's and men's teams to the forefront of the National Junior College Athletic Association Cross Country / Half Marathon picture.

During that time, his women's and mens cross-country teams have amassed 29 National Junior College Athletic Association Academic All Americans, 23 National Junior College Athletic Association All Americans, 64 Western Junior College Athletic Association All Conference Athletes, three Region V Western Junior College Athletic

Association Champions, two National Junior College Athletic Association Women's Half-Marathon Champions and one National Junior College Athletic Association Women's Cross Country Champion.

He has coached his teams to eight Region V Western Junior College Athletic Association titles and one National Junior College Athletic Association Womens Half-Marathon Championship.

Since the program's inception, 93% of his student-athletes were recruited from local high schools and 94% of his student-athletes have graduated. Last year, both men's and women's teams were

awarded National Junior College Athletic Association Academic Teams of the year.

Felix currently serves as the Cross Country Chairman for the Region V Western Junior College Athletic Association and has hosted two National Junior College Athletic Association Cross-Country Championships and three Region V Western Junior College Athletic Association Championships.

A native of El Paso, Felix holds bachelors and master's degrees from the University of Texas at El Paso. He is in his 6th year as Director of Athletics at El Paso Community College.

Bobby Dibler

Official



Bobby Dibler was captain and All-District at Amarillo High. Upon graduation, Bobby led Amarillo College in scoring his freshman and sophomore years averaging 21 points per game. He led his 1962-63 team to the NJCAA National Tournament where he was named to the All National Junior College Tournament Team. Bobby accepted a scholarship from Texas Western (UTEP) in 1963. He was the starting guard on the 1963-64 team that went 25-3, and played with All-American Jim Barnes who was the number one NBA draft choice. Bobby was named to the NCAA All Midwest

Tournament Team in 1964 and graduated from Texas Western in 1965.

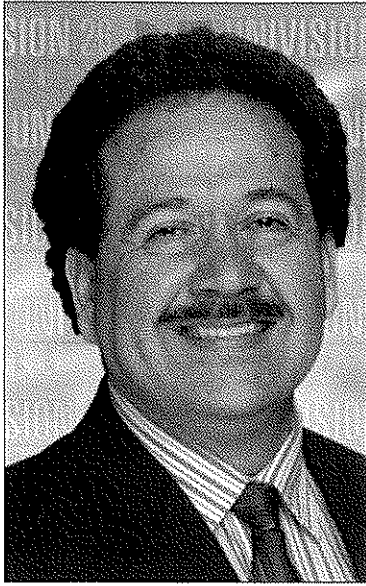
With encouragement from an officiating friend, Yvan Rechy and his wife Carroll's blessing, Bobby joined the local basketball officials association. He built his reputation for five years in high schools before graduation to officiate in the Missouri Valley Conference, WAC, Southwest, Big 8, Pac 10, Big West and Big Sky officiating staffs.

In 1980, Bobby began a run of 14-straight NCAA tournament appearances including three Final 4's. The highlight of his career was officiating two

national championship games - 1982 when Michael Jordan's jumper lifted North Carolina over Georgetown and Villanova's historic 1985 upset of Patrick Ewing's Georgetown.

Bobby retired from active officiating in 1993 and became the WAC and Mountain West Supervisor of Men's Basketball Officials. Her served a two year term on the NCAA Men's Basketball Rules committee in an advisory role. Now Bobby serves as the President of the CCA Coordinators of Men's Basketball Officials Association.

Luis Zuniga
Media / Supporter



Luis Zuniga has devoted his life to bringing the joy of sports to people. For the past 28 years he has been spreading that joy in El Paso.

Think of it – 28 years of sports reporting five nights a week - twice each night. And he did it all those years with such grace, dignity and talent in KINT-TV that his sports program has been often rates No. 1 in El Paso.

He is the longest consecutive tenured sportscaster at the same TV station in El Paso broadcasting history and is highly respected by the El Paso athletic community.

Born on July 8, 1951, Luis went into the media business right after college, which included two years of law school. His resume includes working in print media, radio and television.

His first professional job was as sports editor of the weekly El Sol newspaper in Houston. He turned to radio after that as news announcer and weekend disc jockey at KEYH, the number one Spanish radio station in the Houston metropolitan area.

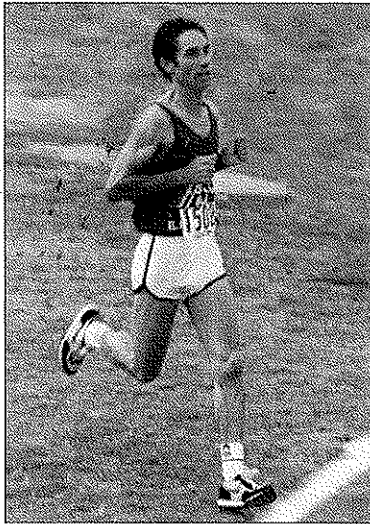
Television came calling in 1982 and he worked in various positions including as news

reporter, cameraman and sports anchor assistant at KWEX, Channel 41, in San Antonio. He moved to El Paso in 1984 as sports anchor at KINT-TV Channel 26 and has been brightening the area ever since.

He has received various awards for his work, including being honored by the El Paso Press Club and Associated Press in New Mexico.

He is a solid family man with a wife, Rosa, and three children: Luis Jr., Marco and Victor, and has been involved in community affairs.

Francisco "Kiki" Cortreras
Posthumous



Kiki was a native El Pasoan who began his running career early in life. He ran the 800 and the mile for El Paso High School, where he was a district and regional champion, and a state qualifier. Kiki graduated from EPHS in 1956.

After high school, Kiki took to running on city streets and parks. Kiki spent countless hours and hundreds of miles running in El Paso. His favorite route were ... Edgemere Blvd, around Burges High School, east and

west on the Gateways and all around Mt. Franklin to include Senic Dr and McKelligon Canyon. He ran so many races that in 1980 the El Paso Times dubbed him "El Paso's Running Machine." Kiki was also a founding member of the Half Fast Track Club, now known as Run El Paso.

Kiki enjoyed great success in road races, but he never let go of his love for running on the track. He was an unbeatable Masters runner in the El Paso area and in the

region. He seldom lost a race on the state and national level in his age group. Kiki proved to be the best 1500m runner in the *El Paso Senior Games* where he went on to set numerous records that to this day still stand.

In 1979 at the age of 42, Kiki ran *The Boston Marathon* with a time of 2:55.19. A life-long dream!

Kiki ran all his races with commitment and passion meriting his place in the El Paso Athletic Hall of Fame.
