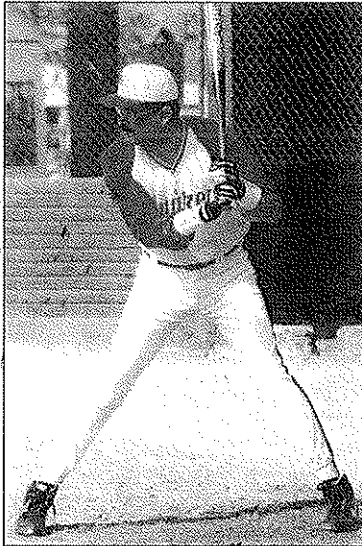

Frank Del Toro
Athlete



Frank Del Toro is one of the most feared batters in the history of El Paso fast-pitch softball. Del Toro starred as a baseball player at Jefferson High then at Ranger Junior College. He later played at UTEP and New Mexico Highlands, not only as an outstanding hitter but an exceptional pitcher.

For more than 40 years, Del Toro has been a terror on the softball diamond. In 2011, his team, the El Paso Tejanos, won the Men's Senior Baseball League World Series with Del Toro batting .474. He has made six more appearances at the International Softball Congress World Tournament highlighted

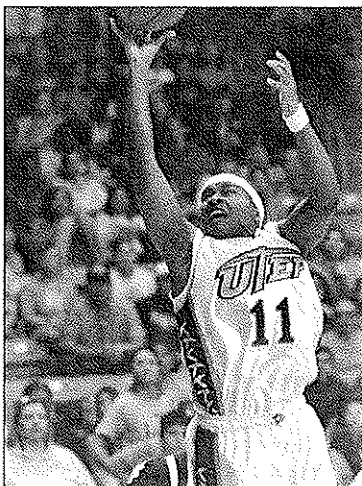
by a 1971 grand slam to defeat the defending ISC champions. At the age of 60, Del Toro played in and won the Mexican national fast-pitch tournament in the 40-49 age group batting .327 for the tourney. Del Toro also played in the Mexican-American national open fast-pitch tournament and played AAA professional baseball with the Juarez Indios as well as in the Pacific Winter League.

Del Toro was varsity baseball coach at Austin and Americas high schools for a combined ten years. In 1989, his Austin baseball team won bi-district and area playoffs. The same year the El Paso Times named him baseball

coach of the year. He's inducted in the Latin-American Softball the El Paso Baseball, Juarez Athletic and El Paso Softball Halls of Fame.

Del Toro owes much of his love of the sport to his mother, Maria and deceased father Frank "Pancho" Del Toro. Frank has a son, Louis Del Toro.

Natasha Lacy
Athlete



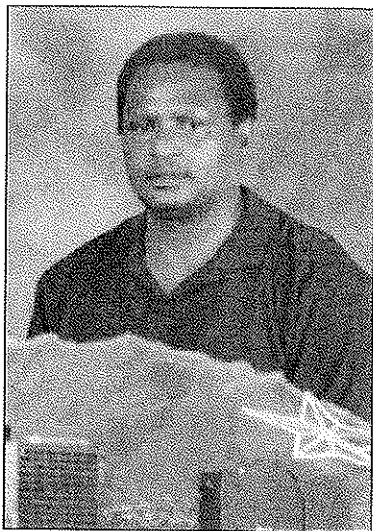
Natasha Lacy's basketball achievements are unparalleled among El Paso born athletes. She is currently on the roster of the WNBA's Connecticut Sun. Drafted by the Detroit Shock, Natasha has also played in the WNBA for the Tulsa Shock, Los Angeles Sparks and Washington Mystics. In addition to the WNBA, she has had a very successful international career earning league champion, MVP, and All Star team honors playing professional basketball in Slovakia, Turkey, Spain, Israel and Cyprus. Natasha is a

2003 graduate of Montwood High where she averaged a triple double her senior year scoring 25 points per game, while averaging 10 rebounds and 10 assists. She was named district and El Paso Times MVP. The first three years of her college career, Natasha led TCU to three straight NCAA tournament appearances and was First Team All-Mountain West her junior year in becoming one of the most decorated players in TCU history. She elected to transfer home and attend UTEP.

Natasha sat out a year and then helped the 2007-08 Miners to the greatest season in UTEP history. The Miners won Conference USA with a 16-0 record, had a 23-game winning streak and advanced to the NCAA tournament for the first time in program history. UTEP defeated Western Kentucky before losing to Stanford in the 2nd round. Natasha was eighth in the nation in steals and Conference USA Newcomer of the Year. The daughter of Austin and Pauline Lacy, she has four older siblings.

James Munyala

Athlete



In 1975 James Munyala made the long journey from his home in Machakos, Kenya, to El Paso to begin what would become a stellar career with the UTEP track and field team. By the time he completed his UTEP Business Administration degree in 1978, James had been named a National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) All-American eleven times, and All-Western Athletic Conference (WAC) eight times.

He was a six-time NCAA National Champion winning the 3000 Meter Steeplechase three times; the Indoor Mile run once; and as a member of the

UTEP Distance Medley Relay team twice. He was also an eight-time WAC Champion winning the 3000 Meter Steeplechase three times; Cross Country twice; the 1500 Meter run once, the Indoor Mile run once, and the Distance Medley Relay once.

A highlight of his career was being ranked #5 in the World in 1976, and #6 in the World in 1977, in the 3000 Meter Steeplechase by the Track and Field News magazine. He represented UTEP and El Paso in numerous track meets in the United States, as well as abroad in England, Denmark, Norway,

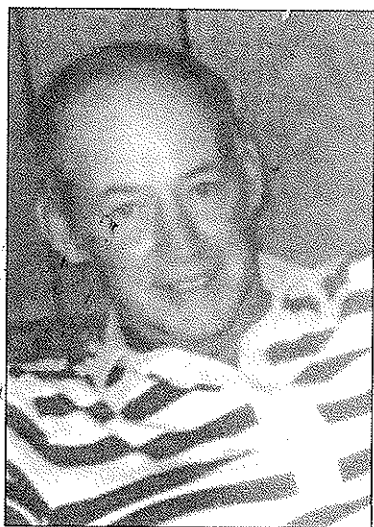
Italy, Finland, Sweden, Africa, Mexico, Canada, Jamaica, Puerto Rico, Costa Rica, and the Isles of Martinique and Guadeloupe, to name a few.

In 1994 he was inducted into the UTEP Track and Field Hall of Fame, and in 2012 he was inducted into the UTEP Athletic Hall of Fame.

He and his wife, Margarita, have three sons, James, Andrew, and John.

Bobby C. Lesley

Coach



Bob was born in Memphis, Texas, 11 miles from Hedley, in September 1940. Most of his school years were at Hedley where he played basketball for Don Haskins.

Bob's senior year, the Hedley Owls won district, regional, and advanced to the state tournament. They lost in a close first game. Bob was on the All-State team and had several scholarship offers. He attended Clarendon Jr. College only 13 miles from Hedley.

At Clarendon, Bob carried a 25+ point average and was named All-American his sophomore year. He was the

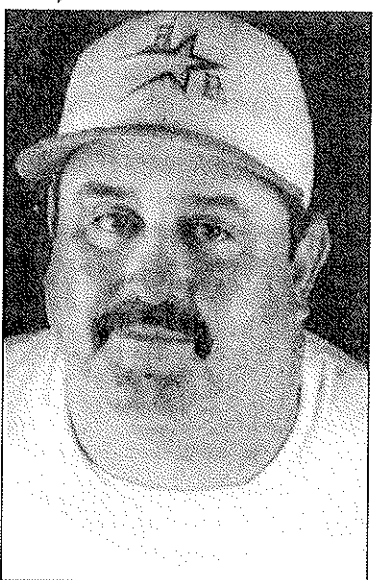
MVP of the National Jr. College All-Star Game and received numerous major college scholarship offers. Don Haskins had just been named the Texas Western coach and recruited Bob to El Paso to be on his first team. Bob accepted and played two years. The Miners won the Sun Bowl Tournament against Texas, but then lost to the Longhorns in the NCAA Regional at Lubbock. Bob graduated from Texas Western and coached several years at Ysleta High before being named the head basketball coach at Eastwood High where he coached for 27

years (1966-1993). He retired from coaching and teaching at age 52 with a won-lost record of 623-197.

In the last 20 years of coaching, his teams advanced beyond district 18 times and in the two years they did not advance, they were 27-8 and 21-9. His record for the last 20 years was 498-131. His teams advanced to regionals 11 times. Bob's crowning achievement was coaching Eastwood to the Texas 4A state championship in 1976 with a record of 31-3. Eastwood named its gym Bobby Lesley Gymnasium in 2002.

Jimmy Melendez

Coach



In 2000, Jimmy Melendez became one of only six El Paso high school baseball coaches to take a team to the U.I.L. Final Four. In 28 years at Riverside, Melendez has captured 17 district championships, 12 bi-district titles and eight Region I area championships.

Melendez graduated from Bel Air before earning a P.E. degree from UTEP and a masters in Mid-Management from Sul Ross. In 2008, Melendez was the first El Pasoan selected to coach in the Texas High School Baseball Coaches All Star Game, a game his team won 2-1. In 2010 and 2011, he was named the pitching coach for Team Texas

Sophomore and Junior Sunbelt Teams and honored by the baseball coaches association for 614 wins.

Melendez is the son of Margarita and Enrique "Kiki" Melendez (an El Paso Baseball Hall of Famer) and has one son, Matthew, who was a two-time All-State baseball player and District 2-4A MVP. Matthew is the assistant varsity coach at Burges. Melendez has been married to the love of his life, Gilda Rosas, for 29 years.

He is a five-time El Paso Times baseball coach of the year and in 2001 was inducted into the El Paso Baseball Hall of Fame. More than 130 of his former players serve in law

enforcement or are firefighters. Another 29 are high school coaches.

Jim Melendez' Riverside teams have won more than 75% of their games. One of El Paso's coaching giants, he will be most remembered for being honest, disciplined and caring.

Steve Kaplowitz Media



Steve Kaplowitz, originally from New York, moved to El Paso in 1978. After graduating from Coronado High School and receiving his bachelor's of arts in broadcasting from the University of Texas in 1995, he returned to El Paso to pursue a career in radio. In 1996, he began hosting a weekend sports talk show on KROD 600. One year later, he took over as the station's program director and moved into the weekday afternoon timeslot as the host of Sportstalk.

Kaplowitz has also spent time as the television play-by-play broadcaster for NMSU

football and basketball, and has worked with UTEP athletics, El Paso Buzzards hockey, and High School sports telecasts on Time Warner Cable. He has worked as both a reporter and weekend anchor at KDBC-TV (CBS), KTSM-TV (NBC), and KFOX-TV (FOX).

For the last 10 years, Kaplowitz has written a weekly sports column for What's Up Magazine. Throughout his radio career, he's interviewed many of the sporting giants of our time. Still, Steve lists his professional highlight as working on the Don Haskins radio show with the Miner

basketball coaching legend from 2006 through 2008.

Kaplowitz, his wife Karen, son Joel, and golden retriever Sophie reside in West El Paso.



Gary B. Crossland Official



While playing as a B-teamer on the Austin High School football team, Gary was asked to coach the Houston Elementary School team until the no-show coach could be replaced. The team ran off eight straight wins and Gary was hooked on coaching. The following year Gary played on the bi-district team and lettered in track.

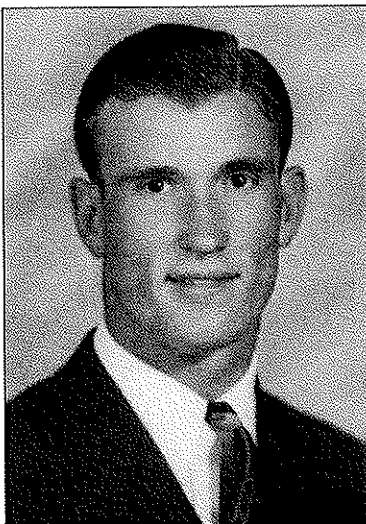
Those were not his only sports—he played fast-pitch softball in several city leagues, including Major. He founded, played and coached the West Texas Ramblers for two years before joining the Western Professional Football League. Gary then started officiating

football, working in the Border and Rocky Mountain Conferences. He brought the Southwest Football Officials Association to El Paso, serving two terms as Secretary and two terms as President, as well as three years as Rules Instructor.

When the Southwest Semi-Pro League was formed, he was picked as an official for the San Antonio Toros, El Paso Matadors, Tulsa Oilers and Dallas All-Stars. Being concessionaire for the El Paso Sun Kings, NMSU, and UTEP during the 60's—the exciting time of the NCAA championship and the opening of the Sun Bowl—kept him close to El Paso sports.

Sponsoring softball, volleyball and bowling teams was another of his endeavors. From coaching—grade schoolers to semi-pros—he learned that officials came in many levels of proficiency. As an official, he always strived to be at the highest level. Gary says that through the years, he worked on the football field with 50 Hall of Fame members—coaches, players and other officials—so being inducted into the EPAHOF carries an honor for him like no other.

Buryl Baty Posthumous



Buryl Baty grew up in Paris, Texas during the Great Depression. There, he was an All-State high school player and set records that still stand, over seventy years later. He went on to play college football at Texas A&M, but his athletic aspirations were interrupted. After serving as a US Army Sergeant in both Europe and the Pacific during World War II, he returned to A&M to further enhance his quarterbacking reputation in a most glorious era of the Southwest Conference.

After college graduation Buryl was drafted by the

professional Detroit Lions, but he instead chose his calling: as a football and life coach, and a dynamic leader. And to many players...a second father. He quickly built Luling High School's team into a winner before accepting a new coaching position in the Segundo Barrio in 1950. His Bowie High Bears shared the District Championship in his first year and won the District Championship decisively in 1953. He and his players loved and fought for each other. The Bears were heavily favored to dominate again in 1954 when Coach Baty and his assistant,

Coach Gerald Simmang, were killed in an auto accident while returning from a scouting trip. Both coaches were survived by young families.

In 1998 alumni honored these coaches for their contributions to the Bowie legacy; the school's home field is now named Baty-Simmang Memorial Stadium. Coach Buryl Baty was inducted into the El Paso Athletic Hall of Fame in 2013.
