Gloria Estrada

Athlete

Well-known as “PRO” and deservedly so, Gloria Estrada is often deemed the greatest shooter in UTEP Women’s Basketball history and one of the best athletes of her time. Famed UTEP coach Don Haskins once said, “If I had a shooter like Gloria Estrada, we could win the WAC Championship.” She routinely played against reputable former UTEP men’s basketball players.

A 1973 graduate of Fabens High School, Estrada averaged 38 points per game, shot 86% from the free throw line, and graduated 3rd in her class. She

became a pioneer, leader, and role model as a member of the first-ever Lady Miner Women’s Basketball team in 1974.

Estrada played during an era with minimal media attention, statistical evidence, funding, and scholarships. She and her teammates simply played for the love of the game, competing in the 14-team Intermountain Conference under coaches Don Lewis and Carol Ammerman.

In 1998, Estrada was honored as one of six players named to El Paso’s 25-Year Silver Anniversary High School

Girls’ Basketball Dream Team. Noted as a superb English teacher and volleyball/basketball coach at San Elizario, Fabens, and Canutillo High Schools. Estrada is the only local coach to take her teams to the Texas State Volleyball 3A Final Four on two separate occasions in 1984 and 1990.

Her parents are Andres and Maria Luisa Estrada. Siblings include David, Norma, Tommy, Bertha, Ernie, Andy, and Alicia. Gloria Estrada was recently inducted into the UTEP Athletic Hall of Fame in 2013.



J.P. Hayes

Athlete

J.P. Hayes came to El Paso and UTEP in 1983 as a lightly recruited high school golfer from Appleton, Wisconsin. He went on to achieve distinction as a Wisconsin State Amateur champion and a key contributor on two NCAA tournament qualifying Miner teams under coach Cricket Musch. Long-time El Paso Country Club professional and El Paso Athletic Hall of Fame member Bill Eschenbrenner helped develop J.P. into a touring professional. From 1989 to 2012, J.P. played in more than 400 PGA and

NIKE/Nationwide/Web.com Tour events. He played in all four majors and as of 2014 had achieved more than \$8 million in career earnings. J.P. won two PGA tour events: the 1998 Buick Classic and the 2002 John Deere Classic.

In November 2008, J.P. drew international tributes for self-reporting accidental use of an unapproved ball. Two strikes of the ball led to his disqualification from the second stage of the PGA Tour Qualifying School. J.P. called officials from his hotel room for a mistake that

no one else had noticed. His honesty cost him a chance to play that season as a regular PGA tour member.

J.P. has made El Paso his home and is the proud parent of 12-year-old Hank and 10-year-old Maggy. He’s served as a motivational speaker for the UTEP and state championship Cedarburg, Wisconsin High School golf teams. J.P. is considering a return to professional golf to include a possible run at the Champions Tour when he becomes eligible in 2015.



Larisa Ito Pitchkolan

Athlete

Larisa Ito Pitchkolan began her love of running at the age of 10 under her first coach Sam Walker. From there began her journey from running sprint relays and 800 meters to running marathons. As part of the Pacesetters track club, Larisa was part of a team placing 4th in the 4 x 800 meter relay in the Junior Olympic National Championship in Seattle, Washington. She ran cross country and track for Coronado High School, where the girls' team qualified for regionals and state in cross

country. Larisa has demonstrated versatility in running distances from 5ks to the marathon. Larisa has run 21 marathons with plans to continue running more. In all 21 marathons, Larisa has qualified for the Boston Marathon. She has run the Boston Marathon 5 times. In 1997 and 1998, Larisa was the second female and first female finisher, respectively, from Texas in the Boston Marathon. Larisa won the Bataan Memorial Death March Marathon on 3/29/2009. She ran her personal best of 3:05:57 in the

Chicago marathon in 2009 one month shy of her 40th birthday. Larisa has won the El Paso Marathon 4 times in a row from 2009-2013. Larisa has continued running through various phases of her life, including school, career, and most importantly, raising her beloved children Alisa, Stephen, and Caroline. Larisa is married to William Pitchkolan, her biggest supporter. Larisa was born and raised in El Paso, Texas. Her parents are Maria del Carmen Ito and Cruz Ito. She is the youngest of four children.



Keitha Adams

Coach

April 20th, 2001. This is the date that the UTEP women's basketball program turned the corner from being a program going nowhere into one with a bright, promising future. This was the date that Keitha Adams was hired to become the 7th women's basketball coach in UTEP history.

Adams came to El Paso from Independence Community College in Independence, Kansas where she had compiled a 127-37 record and taken her team to the NJCAA Regionals for five consecutive years. It wasn't an overnight success but Keitha turned the UTEP program into

one of the best in the country. Her career record at UTEP was 206-157 by the end of her 12th year; however, that doesn't begin to describe her impact on the program.

The Miners were 28-4, including a perfect 16-0 conference record in 2008 and earned the women's program its first ever invitation to the NCAA Tournament where they defeated Western Kentucky in the first round before losing to Stanford. A second invitation followed in 2012 after UTEP posted a 29-4 record. National television coverage, national rankings, players drafted by the WNBA--- all firsts

in UTEP history.

Success on the court is only part of the story. Keitha Adams is first and foremost a teacher and role model. Every player that has finished her eligibility at UTEP has earned a degree. She and her players regularly speak at schools and visit cancer stricken children at local hospitals. Keitha actively supports several El Paso foundations.

Mayor Oscar Leeser has said, "Coach Adams has been recognized nationally, and El Paso should recognize her locally." Tonight we do so by inducting Keitha Adams into the El Paso Athletic Hall of Fame.



Bob Azar

Administrator

For more than 17 years, Bob Azar was the driving force behind a host of key athletic competitions that reshaped the athletic environment in El Paso.

Beginning in 1979, he helped launch the running boom with the creation of the El Paso Run. From 1979 - 1996, he founded and directed a multitude of self-supporting, local and multi-national athletic events, all of which were conducted in both English and Spanish. Chief among these showcase events were the El Paso/Juarez International Games (1981 - 1985), Soccerfest International (1984 - 1992), and the World Collegiate Soccer Championship (1983 -

1992). He was pivotal in arranging El Paso's hosting of the 1983 United States/ Mexico Sister Cities Convention and in 1996 the Texas State Games, the only time these events have come to El Paso City.

He promoted the 1984 match-up between the US National Soccer Team and the Mexican National Soccer Team, held in Juarez as the US victory was witnessed worldwide. Bob also organized an international wheelchair basketball tournament with athletes from the United States, Canada, and Mexico. Many of the athletes were Vietnam War veterans, thus making the event

one of the first international "wounded warrior" competitions.

President Ronald Reagan appointed Azar to the US Information Agency's International Sports Advisory Committee, whose mission was to foster private sector initiatives across the globe (1983 - 1988). Possibly most important, his continued pursuit of local officials was instrumental in the policy changes that made the Sun Bowl, Cohen Stadium and other previously closed facilities available for public use and to outside promoters.



Gene Semko

Official

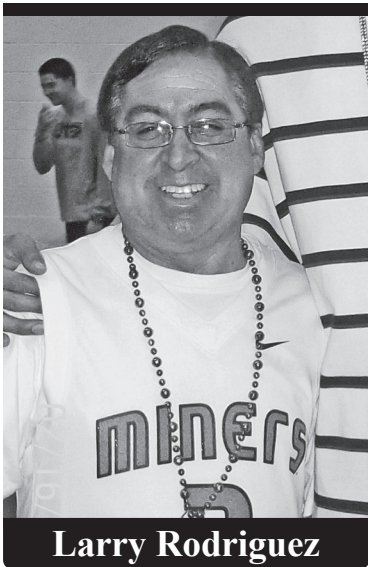
Imagine a career which included on two occasions working the NCAA BCS National Championship game. That describes quickly and efficiently the career of College Football Side Judge Gene Semko. A 1971 Burges graduate, a 1975 UTEP graduate and a 1978 UT Law graduate tells you that Semko is a gentleman that has put his education first.

Gene has been a Division 1 football official for 18 years after serving the El Paso Football Community for 16 years,

the Western Athletic Conference for 8 years and the Big 12 Conference for the past 10 years. He has done numerous bowl games (14 to be exact) including the above mentioned BCS National Championship Games (Ohio St. vs LSU in 2008 and LSU vs Alabama in 2012). Most recently he officiated the 2014 Rose Bowl between Stanford and Michigan State. To his credit he also has worked the Orange Bowl, the Sugar Bowl, 4 Big 12 Championship games and 3 Red River Rival-

ry games. He also was on the goal line in one of the most electric games of the 2008 football season when Texas Tech beat Texas on a last second touchdown pass to Michael Crabtree which defeated the Texas Longhorns.

Gene has been married to his wife Sharon for 34 years. They have two wonderful and successful sons, Jason and Jeremy. He feels very humbled to be inducted into the El Paso Athletic Hall of Fame



Larry Rodriguez

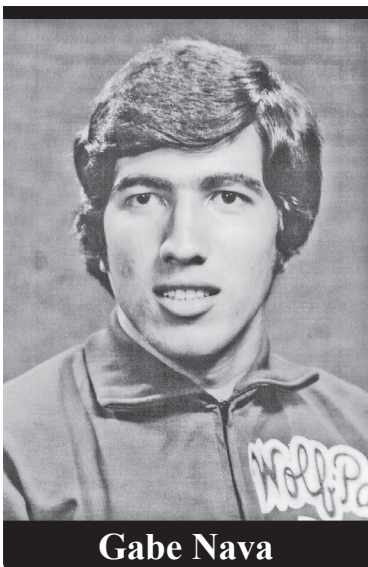
Supporter of Athletics

Larry was born in Baumholder, Germany and grew up in El Paso while his father was stationed at Ft. Bliss. After graduating from Irvin High he enrolled at New Mexico Military Institute where he received the first Drill Team scholarship offered. After graduating from UTEP Larry entered the US Army as a Lieutenant in Air Defense Artillery. Larry served for 8 years including a 3-year tour in Europe as a HAWK Officer and as a Battery Commander at Ft. Bliss. After the US

Army, he began working as a government contractor for several local corporations at Ft. Bliss and White Sands Missile Range. Larry has been involved in army system testing of Hawk, Patriot, Sentinel, Future Combat systems and Network Integration Evaluation programs for future soldiers of the US Army.

In 1999 Larry became involved in the South/Central Miner Fan Club started by Bob Stull, Athletic Director at UTEP. The UTEP Fan Clubs were organized as a volunteer

grassroots sports fan clubs to support UTEP athletics in the city of El Paso. The South/Central Miner Fan Club evolved into the UTEP Miner Fan Club with over 150 active members involved in supporting MFC activities as well as all UTEP athletics in the city of El Paso. The UTEP Miner Fan Club has participated in canned food drives, UTEP athletic team meals, monthly meetings, tailgates, radio shows, out of town trips to attend and support UTEP athletics on the road.



Gabe Nava

Posthumous

Gabe Nava was a winner both on and off the basketball court. A native El Pasoan defined by grace and humility, loved and respected by all. A role model and mentor and the first in his extended family to attend college, he set a fine example for Hispanic youth.

Gabe was starting guard at Austin High School during four championship years in 1966 – 70. As a freshman Gabe was the 2nd leading scorer on a freshman team that went undefeated and won the district 1-4A championship. In his varsity sophomore year

Austin went 18-9 and won the Roswell Invitational Tournament championship. As a junior Austin went 26-5 capturing the District 1-4A Championship, Bi-district championship, and Gabe was named to the “All Tournament Teams” of the Amarillo and Roswell Invitational Tournaments. In his senior year he led Austin to its second consecutive District 1-4A championship and its second consecutive Bi-District championship. Gabe was the leading scorer and named first team All-District for the second consecutive year. He

was named to the all-tournament teams in the Midland and Roswell Invitational Tournaments (MVP at Roswell), and led Austin to championships in both tournaments.

He accepted a scholarship with the University of New Mexico and was a starter there for four years, appearing in the NIT in 1973. In 1974 he led them to a WAC Championship and appeared in the NCAA advancing to the West regional. After his college career he went on to play in the 1976 Olympics in Montreal.
