# EL PASO ATHLETIC HALL OF FAME HONORES 2018



Athlete

William Licon was born August 25, 1994 in El Paso and started swimming at age 7. By 9, he was competing for the West Texas Typhoon Swim Club, founded by his father, where he swam until he was 13. During that time, he broke 50 Border Swimming records and was a 26-time TAGS champion. To get to the next level of swimming, Licon moved to Plano, Texas in 2009 where he swam for the City of Plano Swimmers and moved to Austin, in 2011 where he swam for Nitro Swimming before accepting a swimming scholarship in 2013 to swim for the University of Texas and coach Eddie Reese.

During his 4 years at Texas, he set 6 school and Big 12 records and won 11 NCAA titles while leading the Longhorns to 3

consecutive NCAA Championships (2015-2017). He is currently the NCAA and American record holder in the 200 yard breaststroke (1:47.91), becoming the first person ever to break 1:48. Licon was named Texas' Most Valuable Swimmer in 2015, 2016 and 2017 and the Big12 Conference Swimmer of the year in 2015 and 2017. In 2017 he completed his swimming career at Texas as a 15-time First Team All-American and a Honorable 2-time Mention All-American and was the first swimmer in history to be voted the Big 12 Conference ATHLETE of the year.

At the 2016 U.S. Olympic Trials, Licon finished 3rd in the 200 meter breaststroke, missing the Olympics by 0.14 seconds.



Athlete

Robert Rodriguez, an El Paso native, attended Montwood High School and lettered in both football and basketball. He was a standout running back and was the El Paso Times Offensive Player of the Year and All City First Team Running Back in 1999. He then accepted a Football Scolarship to play for UTEP.


Converting to Linebacker, Rodriguez finished ranked fifth on the all-time UTEP tackle chart with 443 tackles, including 33 for losses. He led the Western Athletic Conference in tackles in three of his four seasons at UTEP. He was the Defensive Captain of the 2004 UTEP team that was ranked in the AP Top 25 and played in the Houston Bowl.

After the season, Rodriguez was named First Team All Conference Linebacker and the Conference Defensive Player of the Year. He was then invited to play in the Prestigious East West Shrine Game.

In 2005, Rodriguez signed with the Tennessee Titans as an undrafted free agent. He then went on to join the Carolina Panthers Practice Squad where they advanced to the NFC Championship game. Following the season, he played for the Cologne Centurions of NFL Europe. He then went on to sign with the Calgary Stampeders of the Canadian Football League and played through 2007.

Rodriguez then transitioned to Coaching spending 7 Seasons at UTEP before joining the Minnesota Vikings in 2015.

Rodriguez and his wife Holly, an attorney and former UTEP Athlete, have 2 sons, Caleb and Jesse.



Athlete

Brandon Wolfram grew up playing basketball in Amarillo, Texas. After several ups and downs in high school, including double knee surgery, he returned for a successful senior season in 1996-97: his team won district and Brandon was named District 3-5A MVP (and All-Region First Team).


Brandon came to play for UTEP in 1997 after being recruited by Hall of Fame Coach Don Haskins. Over the next four seasons he was named to the WAC All-Newcomer Team, All-Conference Second Team, and twice to the All-Conference First Team. Brandon finished his career as the All-Time Leading Scorer in UTEP history (currently third). He also held several other school records, including highest season and career field goal percentages.

Brandon was twice named to the NCAA All-Academic First Team (1999-2000, 2000-2001). He was

named the UTEP Male Athlete of the Year in 1999-2000, received the Golden Miner award in 2000-2001, and was named Harlem Globetrotter Goodwill Ambassador in 2001.

After UTEP, Brandon played in Europe (Greece, Poland, and Italy) before returning to El Paso in 2002. He worked for the Fellowship of Christian Athletes until 2005, heading up the Far West Texas region. In 2005 Brandon decided to play basketball again, spending the next five seasons playing professionally in Spain (2005-2010).

After finishing his career, Brandon moved back to El Paso. He started working with athletes and formed his sports training business (Sport Progression) in 2013. While sports are important, Brandon's primary focus is keeping everything in perspective with God first in his life.



Coach

Marc Bombard – after a stellar career as a pitcher, which included all-district honors at Eastwood High School and holds UTEP's school records for wins, strike outs, complete games, and innings pitched under then head coach Andy Cohen. Bombard pitched professionally for the Cincinnati Reds organization from 1971-1977, and he threw three no-hitters. Bombard began his managerial career in 1982 in Billings, Montana. Over the next 35 years, he managed 3,587 games in all levels of the Minor Leagues, and he ranks 20th all-time with 1,846 wins. Bombard has won three league championships (Billings 1983, Cedar Rapids 1988, and Indianapolis 1994). He also coached third base for the Cincinnati Reds in 1996 and first base for the Philadelphia Phillies in 2005 and 2006. He is also a member of four other Hall of Fames (Florida State League, International League, El Paso Baseball, and UTEP). Bombard is married to Gema, has two daughters, Amy and Janet, and two grandchildren. The Bombards reside in Tampa, Florida.



Coach

Rennie Rebe attended El Paso High School where she was a multi-sport star athlete. In 1996, she was inducted into the EPHS Athletic Hall of Fame. Rebe played Division I soccer at Texas A&M University where she was a 4-year starter and team captain; she went on to obtain a Masters Degree in Educational Administration from Texas State University.

Coach Rebe started her soccer head coaching career at Franklin High School where she had a district record of 30-0. She went on to record one of the best records as a Texas coach at Stony Point in Rock, Kingwood Round Humble, Westlake in Austin, where she had a run of 48 straight district wins, and Hendrickson in Pflugerville where her team won a 6A State Championship. Over the course of her 19 years, she has accumulated an Overall Record of 369-90-31 and District Record of 199-32-8. In

addition to the State Championship, her teams have earned 6 Regional Final and 2 Regional Semi-Final tournament appearances, 4 Regional Quarterfinal finishes, 5 Area appearances, and 14 District Championships.

Coach Rebe has earned recognition for her coaching ability at the national level as the National Federation of High Schools-Texas Coach of the Year-Girls Soccer. She has also been named Region I & Region II Coach of the Year, Top Drawer Texas-South Coach of the Year. She is a 2-time All Central Texas Coach of the Year, El Paso Times, Westlake Picayune and Williamson County Coach of the Year, and a 9-time District Coach of the Year.

Rennie has been a proud educator and coach for 20 years and considers herself honored to have coached and interacted with so many outstanding young people.



Official

Bernie was born and raised in El Paso, and has lived here all his life. He attended Houston Elementary School and graduated from Austin High School in 1966. He then graduated from UTEP in 1971 with a BBA. While at UTEP, he was a member of Alpha Beta Service Fraternity and was a 1971 Men of Mines. He received his Master's in Administrative Education from Stephen F. Austin in 1996.

Bernie served in the US Army from 1971-1974 and was stationed at Fort Bliss where he began his officiating career in 1972. Starting from his days at Fort Bliss, Bernie has called almost every level of football and basketball for 46 years. He called all sports on Fort Bliss, Parks and Recreation, middle school, varsity and college sports. Bernie has officiated more than 10,000 games in all sports.

During his 45 year football

career, he has called more varsity games and more varsity playoff games than any other official in the history of El Paso football. In 2016 he officiated the New Mexico 4-AState Championship. From 1988-1994, he officiated in the Western Athletic Conference, which included calling games at BYU, Nebraska, Utah, SDSU, Hawaii, Air Force Academy and UTEP.

In his 46 years of calling basket-ball, Bernie has officiated all levels of boys and girls. Along the way he called many local playoff games including 9 boys and girls Texas Regionals. He also officiated small college and Jr. college games.

Bernie is married to Teresa Lopez del Hierro and has three children, Bernardo Mario, Michael and Danielle. He retired after 18 years as the Athletic Director at San Elizario ISD in 2014.



Supporter of Athletics


Manuel "Manny" Ontiveros was born in El Paso, Texas. He was nominated for the El Paso Athletic Hall of Fame by Charter Member Ray Sanchez in the Supporter of Athletics Category. He has been married to Lydia for 48 years. Their daughter Melissa Yvette is married to Julio Cesar Marquez.

Manny graduated from Bowie High School in 1966 and is a graduate of El Paso Community College and UTEP. At UTEP, he worked in the Intramurals Department where he was voted Most Valuable Official 1969-70. He then worked as a Sports Reporter for the El Paso Herald-Post before joining the U.S. Army 1971-1974. He also worked as a News Reporter for the Herald-Post, and as an assistant to Congressman Richard C. White. He then worked as an Employee and Labor Relations

Specialist at Fort Bliss and with U.S. Customs and Border Protection. He retired in 2009.

He has played in and helped manage the Boys and Girls Clubs of El Paso Alumni Association's yearly fund-raising golf tournament for 17 years, through which it has given more than \$100,000 in college scholarships to numerous students from Bowie, Jefferson, and Mountain View High Schools.

He has been a member of the Hall's nominating committee for 22 years, where he has served as Director of Archives for the past 18 years and has coordinated the duties associated with the plaques of selected Hall inductees for the past 8 years. He served as President of the Hall for 2016 and 2017.



Posthumous

Manuel X. Aguilar (Aggie) was born on April 30, 1932 in El Paso, Texas.

He played football at Cathedral High School, from 1947-1950. He was recognized in 1948 and 1949 as All District Fullback and All City Fullback. In 1949, he was the El Paso City Scoring Champion and selected MVP for his Cathedral Football Team.

He was all Conference in 1950 at Fort Lewis College in Durango. That year, they won the Desert Bowl in Blythe, California.

In 1951, Aggie joined the United States Navy. He played quarter-back for the Navy Service Football Team. In 1956 he played semi-professional football with the El Paso Dons.

Manny was selected to the All 1950s High School All Star Football Team in 1959.

1961, he began his head football career and served as athletic director for Cathedral. In 1963 the Irish went 7-3 and 9-1 in 1969.

Manny served as assistant principal at Cathedral while also taking on head football coach and athletic director duties from 1967-1971.

In 1973, he coached the El Paso Matadors Semi-Professional Football Team. He was inducted to the Cathedral Athletic Hall of Fame, in 1974.

1972-1976, landed him at the El Paso Job Corps and the El Paso Mayor's Youth Assistance Program. He also completed his Master's Degree from Sul Ross in 1976.

From 1976-1979, he was principal and assistant superintendent in Canutillo. He moved on to the principal's job at Gadsden and became the superintendent for Gadsden ISD from 1980-1983.

Aggie's dream was to return to Cathedral and retire. He returned to Cathedral for two years before taking the principal's job at Anthony High School from 1985-1987.

In 1991 Manny returned to teaching and coaching at Andress. In 1995, he moved to Jefferson.

In 2000, MXA was appointed athletic director at Cathedral. He finally made it back home.
