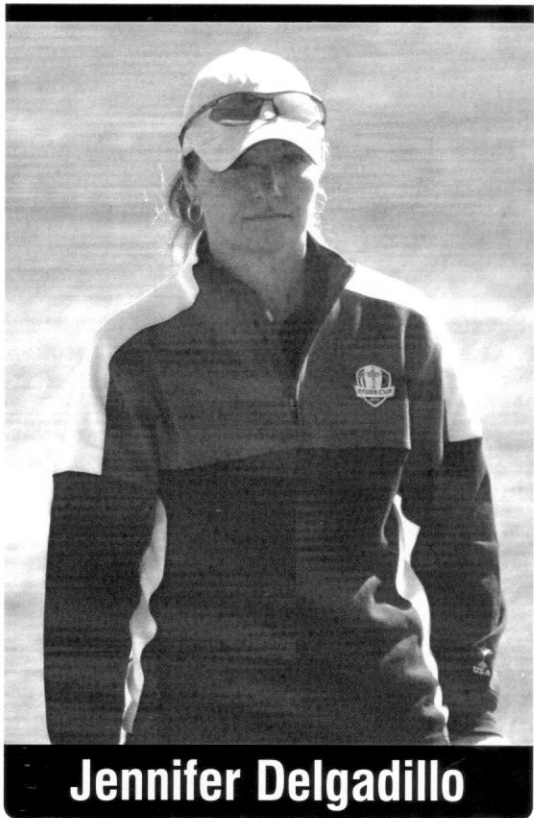

Jennifer Delgadillo

Athlete

Jennifer Delgadillo is a native El Pasoan who attended Irvin High School where she started playing golf her sophomore year. Under the guidance of Coach Ed Torres, Jennifer placed second in district her senior year which qualified her as Irvin’s first golfer to make regionals in Lubbock. After graduating in 1992, Jennifer won four junior summer tournaments securing her a scholarship to play for UTEP.

In her senior year at UTEP, Jennifer played well enough to have the honor of being named to the All WAC Golf Team in 1996. The next year, she graduated with both an Accounting and Management degree. Jennifer’s golfing career has extended beyond El Paso, competing regularly at the national level. She has qualified for 9 Women’s Mid-Am Champi-

onships, 3 Pub Links Championships, and 1 Four Ball Championship. She has over 12 Sun Country Amateur Championship regional wins and has been named the Sun Country Amateur Association’s Women Player of the Year five different times. She has won the El Paso City Championship twice, both in 2008 and 2016, with numerous runner-up finishes. She actually set a scoring record for the tournament by shooting rounds of 67 and 64 to win by 9 strokes in the 2016 victory. In 2017, she was also honored by being inducted into the El Paso Golf Hall of Fame.

Jennifer has been married to PGA Professional Luis Delgadillo for over 20 years. They have two sons: Alex 19, who plays golf at the University of Arkansas- Ft. Smith, and Aaron 16, who plays varsity football at Eastwood High.



Holly Cohen Mata

Athlete

Holly Cohen Mata was a Franklin High School soccer standout as well as a highly decorated UTEP soccer student, athlete and coach.

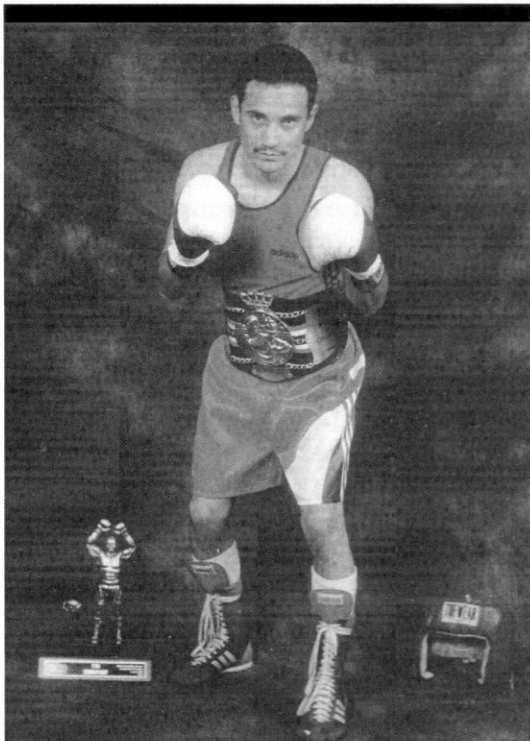
At Franklin, Holly was a 3 time All State Soccer Player, 4 time All District and All Region Player, 2 time El Paso MVP, scored 72 goals her senior season and received an athletic scholarship to play Division 1 soccer. At Arizona State, she was 17th in scoring in the Pac-10 and received ASU's rookie of the year.

In only 2 years at UTEP, Holly achieved many accolades including Conference Tourney MVP, 2 time All Conference Player, 4th in scoring in the entire NCAA, and 1st Team Academic All – American. She's UTEP's single season all time leading scorer, 3rd career all time leading scorer in just 2 seasons, and was UTEP's Miner

of the Year. She graduated Magna Cum Laude and also played for the UTEP Women's softball team as well as kicked for the UTEP Men's football team. As a coach, she led UTEP to its 1st ever NCAA Tournament birth and win against University of Texas. She also helped UTEP with top ranked recruiting classes each season she coached.

Her success on and off the field has allowed her to continue that success as a crossfit competitor. Holly qualified for the coveted Crossfit Games as an individual competitor, finishing 37th in the world. Holly currently continues to compete in crossfit.

She is married to Joe Mata, has a 7 yr old son Shepherd, twin 22 month old girls Cruize and Charleigh and is pregnant with baby number 4.

Jorge Muñoz is 51 years old, He is the oldest of 7 siblings. Jorge has been married for 28 years and has 4 children, 3 girls and 1 boy.

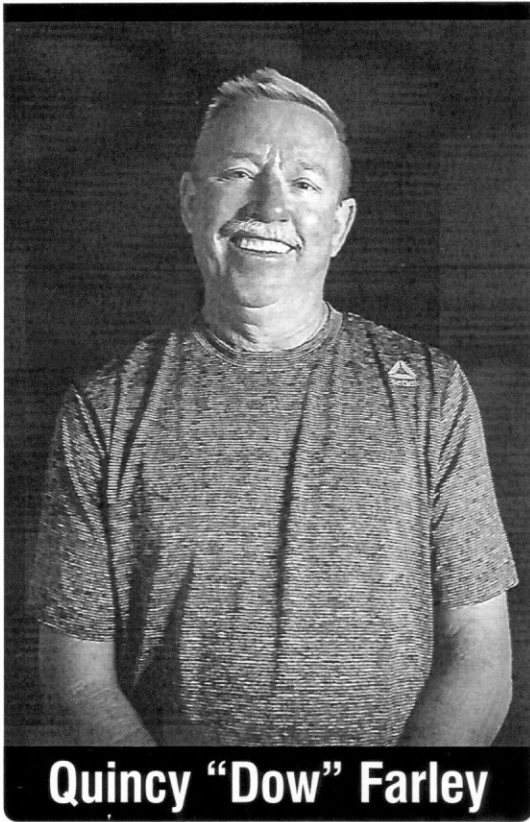
Jorge's oldest daughter Georgina graduated from UT Austin as so did his son Jorge Jr. His youngest child Almita is graduating from UT Austin this summer, has joined the Peace Corps and will be deployed to Africa after graduation. Jorge's second child Brenda is a special education teacher from Lady of The Lake University. Jorge attended UTEP from 1989 to 1991.

He began boxing in Juárez Mexico at the age of 11 years. Jorge's father took him to the gym to prevent him from getting involved with the wrong people. Jorge was not a full time boxer; he only practiced boxing during summer break. Jorge's father always thought that school was

Jorge is married to Alma Muñoz who is an anesthesiologist technician. Jorge has worked for U.S. Customs and Border Protection for 20 years. He is currently a supervisor with CBP.

Coach

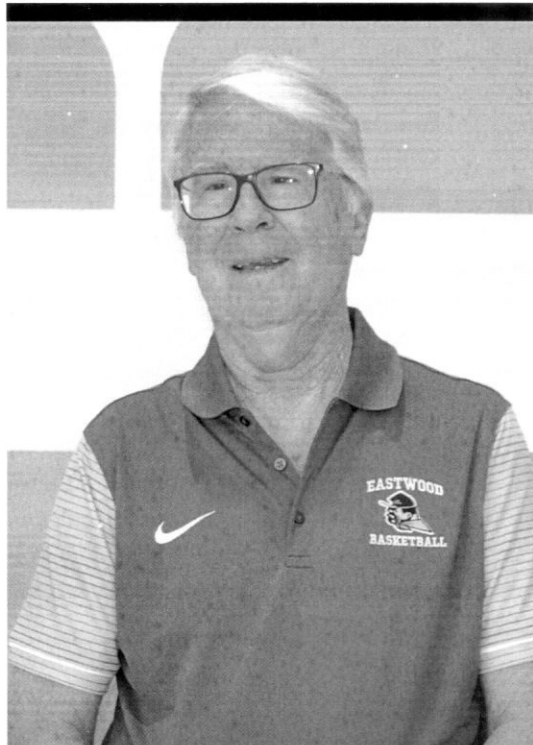
Quincy "Dow" Farley is 60 years old and has been married to his awesome wife Krystyne for nineteen years. They have been blessed with two beautiful children; Ryan Perez and Chase Farley, and four exceptional grandchildren; Kaidence, Xavier, Charlee and Oakley. Dow was born and raised in El Paso, Texas. He is a 1976 graduate of Burges High School and a 1982 graduate of the University of Texas El Paso. He received his master's degree from Sul Ross University.

My basketball career started as a player at Bel-Air High School where I played four years of basketball and continued into college at Willamette University where I played my freshman year. After graduating from Willamette with a history degree, I returned to El Paso and in 1967, thanks to Coach Bob Lesley I became his Junior Varsity Coach. In 1970, Uncle Sam came calling and as a result I put my coaching career on hold and went into the US Army. Then in 1973, I resumed my teaching and coaching career at Eastwood High School. In 1976, under the leadership of Bob Lesley, Eastwood won the 1976 Boys Basketball 4-A State Championship.

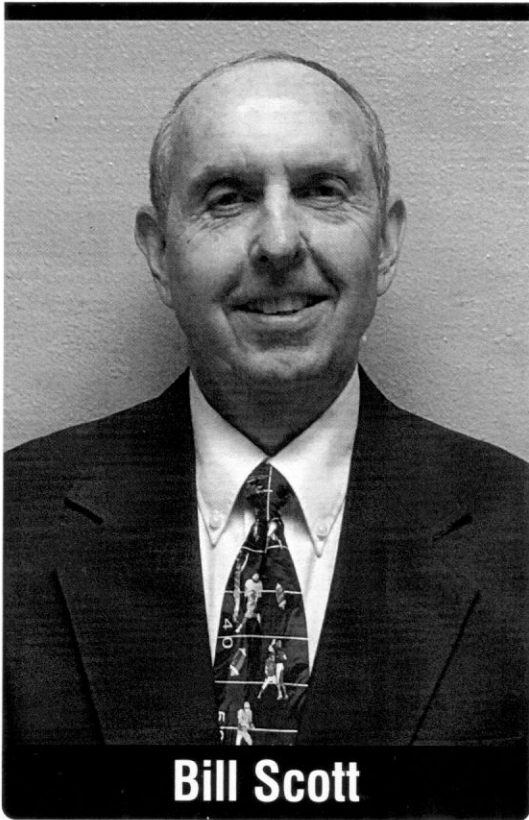
In 1993, when Bob Lesley retired I became Eastwood's

third head coach until I retired in 2018.

During my tenure as head coach, I was named "Coach of the Year" by the El Paso Times and El Paso Herald Post in 1996 and again in 1997. From 1967 to 2018, Eastwood won 1062 games and qualified for the State Tournament 36 times.

Coaching basketball has always been my true passion but teaching Government is a close second. In 1987, I was honored by my colleagues as Eastwood's "Teacher of the Year".

Official

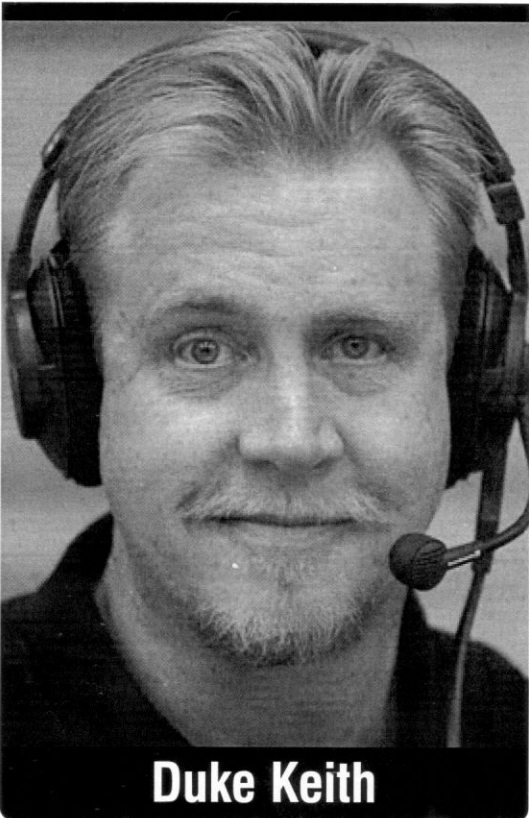
Bill was born and raised in El Paso attending Bonham, MacArthur and Burges High School. He attended UTEP for 2 years before transferring to Texas Tech where he earned BBA and MBA degrees. After college Bill returned to El Paso and worked for the accounting firm KPMG Peat Marwick for 5 years before going to work for a real estate property management company.

Bill joined the El Paso football officials chapter in 1986 and started officiating middle school games. In 1990 he began officiating high school varsity games to go along with the middle school, 9th grade and junior varsity games on his schedule. He is still an active member of the El Paso football officials chapter attending meetings every Monday night during the football season and serving as Rules

Interpreter for the past 20 years.

In 2000 Bill was selected to be a member of the football officiating staff of the Western Athletic Conference. In 2007 he moved to the officiating staff of the Mountain West Conference. In 2010 he joined the staff of the officiating consortium CFO-West which assigns football officials to the Big XII, Mountain West and Southland Conferences.

During his career Bill has officiated 13 bowl games, including the 2005 Sun Bowl game between UCLA and Northwestern. In addition, he officiated the 2015 Red River Rivalry game between Texas and Oklahoma. Some of the schools he has officiated include Alabama, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, Michigan State, Nebraska, Ohio State, Oregon and Washington.

The son of legendary OU and Texas A&M sports publicist John Keith and grandson of the Sooners' pioneer SID Harold Keith, Duke Keith came to El Paso in 1990 as UTEP's Assistant Media Relations Director. Keith's work helped punter Ed Bunn to become a Walter Camp Football Foundation first-team all-American in 1992 despite the Miners 1-10 record.

Keith moved into radio that fall as producer and co-host of SportsTalk on KROD-AM. He also coined the name Football Friday Nights for KROD's new high school football roundup show.

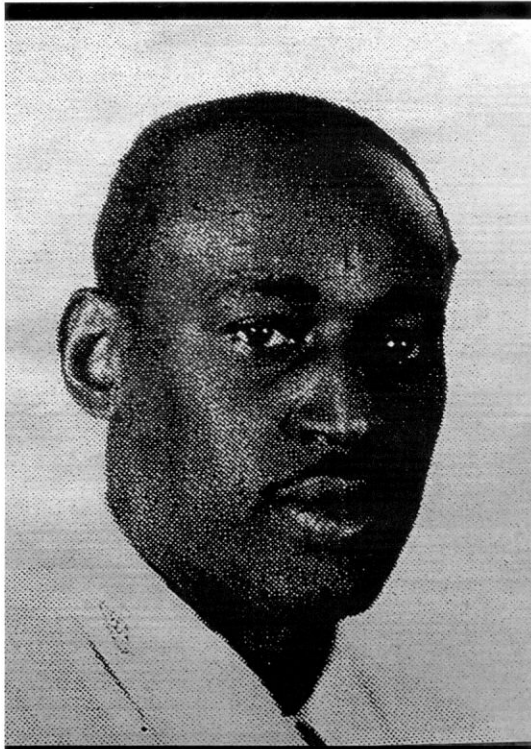
As Sports Director for the KLAQ Morning Show for 14 years, Keith not only covered the serious headlines, he also contributed original sports humor to nationally-syndicated radio

programming services for over three decades, and still does.

Keith has done radio and television play-by-play for UTEP football, men's and women's basketball and numerous high school and professional sports across El Paso. He has called games nationally for CBS Sports, be INSports and ESPN and was the longtime play-by-play voice of Time Warner Cable.

He also kept an active hand in sports publicity, working for many seasons with El Paso Patriots soccer, El Paso Buzzards hockey and El Paso Rhinos hockey, for whom he still calls games.

Eugene Augustus Desboine

Posthumous

Coach Eugene A. Desboine was born April 18, 1913, in Beaumont, Texas. He attended catholic school through elementary and high school, attended college at Strait College in New Orleans, Louisiana and Tillotson College in Austin, Texas. After he and his family moved to El Paso, Texas, in 1946, Coach Desboine received his masters degree in education from New Mexico A&M Las Cruces, New Mexico.

Coach Eugene Desboine, began his teaching career at Douglass High School, the only black school in El Paso, as a science teacher and later became a physical education coach in 1946. He coached grades 6-12th, and was varisty head football and basketball coach. He achieved a very impressive basketball record in the Texas Black High School District. His record was 6 district titles and 4 second place finishes. This district included: Douglass of El Paso, Midland Carver, Odessa Ector, Woodson of Abilene and Caver of Amarillo, Texas. These were some pretty tough teams. Douglass High School also played some schools from

Juarez, Mexico. Coach Desboine was the only black coach in El Paso, Texas for many years. He was a member of various professional organizations.

After El Paso schools became desegregated, regardless of so many years of coaching experience and his impressive record as a basketball coach, Coach Desboine was not given a chance to become a freshman, J.V nor a varsity coach. Coach Desboine remained at Douglass and encouraged students to be the best they could be in life and to never give up on anything! Even through many of his players have passed on, he is still remembered for his patience and fortitude in the El Paso community. Many of his ex-students have joined the Law Enforcement field. Working for the El Paso Police Department were Austin Tubbs, Curtis Williams, and James Basin; the first black motorcycle policeman. Members of the El Paso Sheriff's office were John Douglas and Bruce Mathis. Curtis and John Jimmerson joined the FBI in New York City. Coaches were Nolan Richardson, Lou James as well as many others.
