



But the night belonged to Robles, the sophomore tailback from El Paso Jefferson, who tallied three touchdowns on runs of 11, 21, and 55 yards. Teaming well with Granger on the option, he rambled for a total of 233 yards in a tandem offense — 178 as a runner and 55 as a pass receiver. Only a third stringer after spring ball, Robles got his chance when injured sidelined Ray Maxey and John Sanders.

The Mustangs took the kickoff and marched 80 yards into the wind on nine running plays, with Robles and tailback Tom Fields providing the key first down rushes. With first down on the CSM 11, Robles took an option pitch and swept around and untouched. Dave Jaquaz added the first of his four PAT kicks.

After forcing the Orediggers to punt, Western again began a touchdown march from its own 27. A quick pass to end Dale Konow moved the ball to the Western 47, but the drive appeared stalled when the Mustangs were charged with a holding penalty. Then Orelager hit Robles on a short follow pattern and the tailback drifted through the Oredigger secondary to track up the longest scoring strike for WNMU this season, with 7:29 remaining in the first quarter. Western led 14-0.

After the Jamson stopped the Mines drive with an interception, and insured that the record would be buried in their

Mines added its score on a 17 yard pass from quarterback Dennis Lockett to end Mike Colloff. The try for a two point conversion failed.

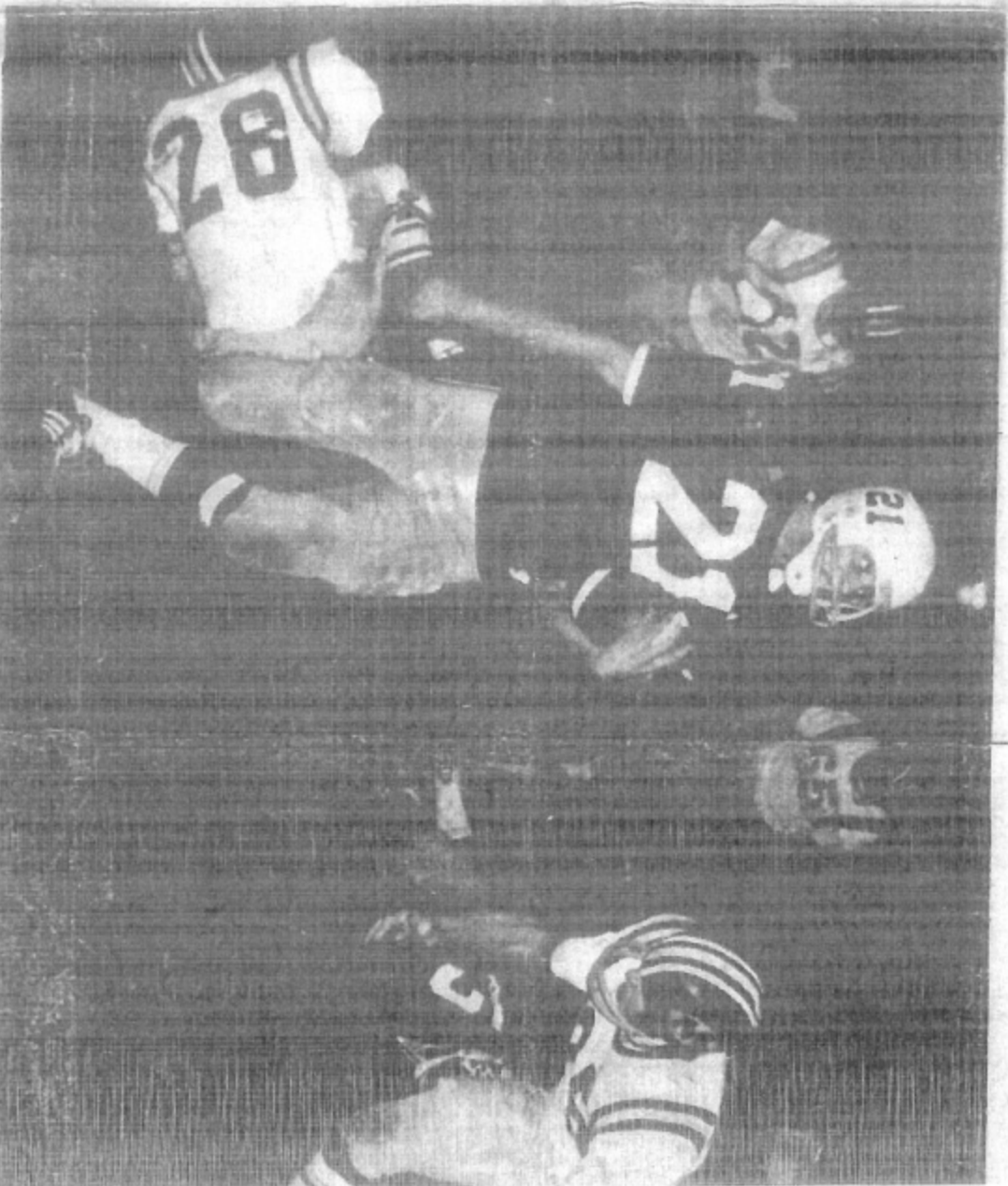

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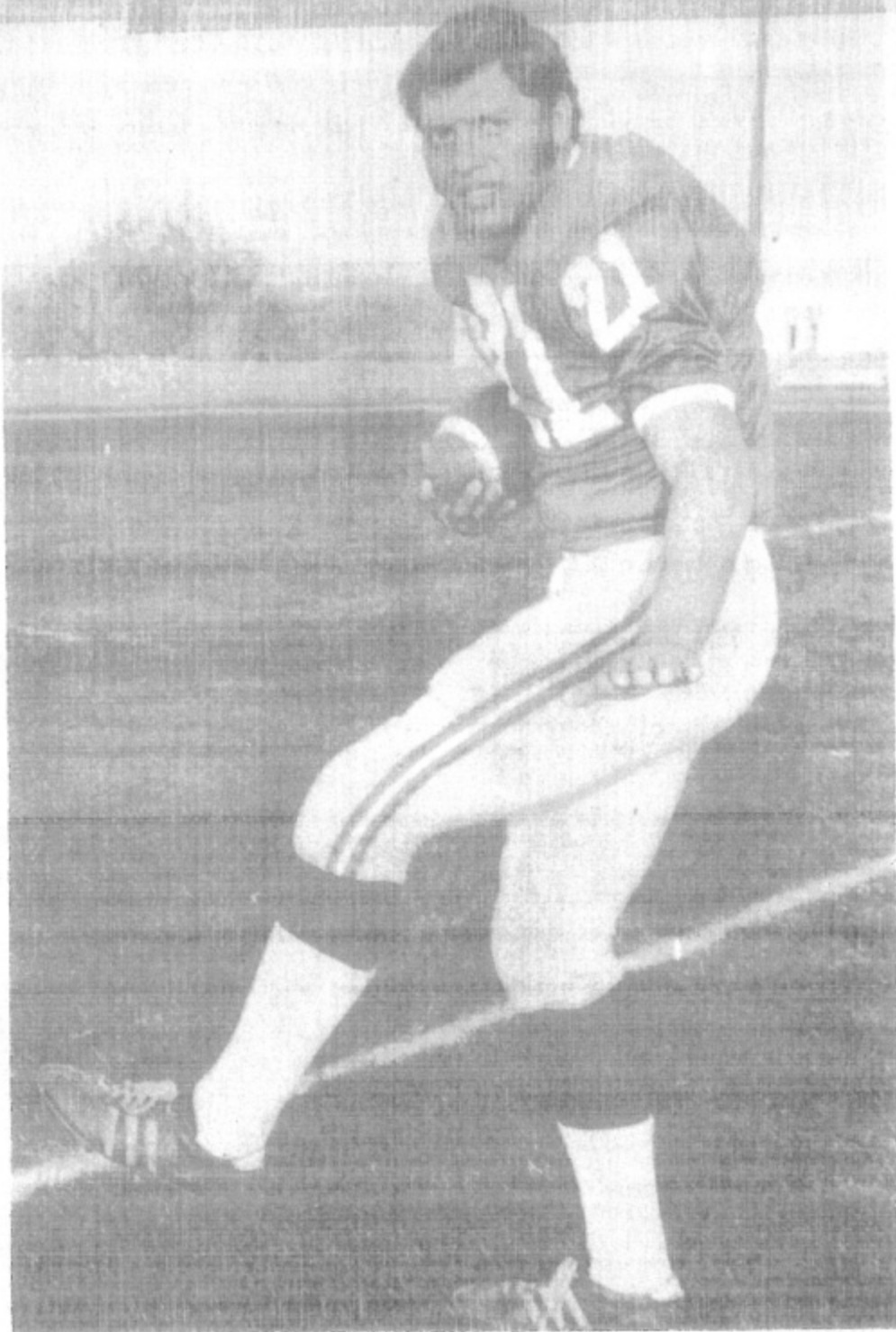

Dell City excited about its football team

Dell City's football team — which has advanced to the second round of the state six-man playoffs — has this community of 600 in a frenzy.

Last Friday, Dell City (9-2) drew a crowd of almost 2,000 spectators in a 73-24 victory over Wellman in Monahans, Texas.

"The community here is quite ecstatic," Dell City's second-year coach Tony Robles said Wednesday. "The telephone has been ringing off the hook with people calling to see who and where we're playing next."

The Cougars — paced by David Gallegos' 2,456 yards rushing and 40 touchdowns — will play always-tough Lazbuddie (12-0) at 7 p.m. MST Friday at Grady High School in Lenorah, Texas. The winner of that game advances to the semifinals against Saturday's survivor at Wellman between No. 1 Fort Hancock (11-0) and Chillicothe (10-1).

Turning the Dell City program from an also-ran in District 8 — the same league as Fort Hancock's state champions — has given the high school of 103 students an emotional lift.

School principal Leonel Rubio said the school had no problem filling up a student activities' bus for the trip Friday, even after Thanksgiving Day.

"The success of the football program, the kids, the coaches and Coach Robles in particular has brought together the entire community," said Rubio, who also has been at DCHS two years. "We had an excellent following at Monahans. I think coach Robles has been a jewel to us."

Robles, 42, spent the 1989 and '90 seasons at Fabens before moving to Dell City. He was also Jefferson's defensive coordinator (1985-87) and Socorro High's head coach in 1982-83.

So winning has also boosted Robles' confidence.

"It got to the point where I had doubts in my mind that I was any type of a coach," he

said. "Here I've been given the freedom to put a team together the way I see fit. Everybody gave me my ground."

That freedom to use his 15-year coaching experience has paid off this season for the Cougars, who have averaged 61.5 points per game with Gallegos passing for 967 yards and another 15 touchdowns. Quarterback Raul Martos has passed for 818 yards and 18 TDs.

The Cougars' prime receiving targets have been Leonel Hernandez, 100 receptions for 556 yards and 17 touchdowns; and Clay Gentry, 20-397 and 8 TDs.

On defense, junior end Eddie Parra (132 tackles) and senior end Javier Martinez (98 tackles) have led DCHS to a 31.1 winning margin.

Should Dell City and The Fort survive this round, there's been speculation that such a semifinal game could be played at the new Socorro Stadium. But Robles said that's strictly speculation and his biggest concern at the moment is Lazbuddie.

Wellman (W5) (11-0) vs. Dell City (R8) (8-2)

8 p.m., Lobo Stadium, Monahans.
The essentials: Wildcats head coach John Cornelius said his team may have a slight advantage having already played a playoff game last week. Wellman defeated Loraine, 53-6, and Dell City had a bye. Tailback Francisco Franco, who had 202 yards and four touchdowns rushing last week, leads the Wildcats on offense. Quarterback Matt Paul added 74 yards passing. The Wildcats usually are not a passing team, but Cornelius said they may have to against Dell City. The Cougars are led on offense by tailback David Gallegos, who has rushed for 1,800 yards and 26 touchdowns. Wide receiver Clay Gentry has 40 receptions.

Rivalry: Wellman and Dell City never have met before and have no opponents in common from this season.

6-man football gives Dell City a taste of victory

DELL CITY, Texas — They're talking football again in Dell City.

Winning football.

The six-man football team in this town 70 miles northeast of El Paso is 5-1 and close to clinching a playoff berth in District 8.

"It's something new to them," Dell City coach Tony Robles said Wednesday. "They seem to like it. ... It's something this community was hungry for."

One reason for the Cougars' success is running back David Gallegos.

Gallegos, a 155-pound junior, has led the Cougars with 875 yards rushing and has scored 19 touchdowns in the team's multiple offense attack. He has scored 16 touchdowns on runs, pass receptions, punt returns, kickoff returns and fumble recoveries.

Last Friday, Gallegos' 45-yard interception return led Dell City past Belmerhee 78-28. Gallegos' biggest rushing numbers came in a 39-96 come-from-behind victory over Sierra Blanca: 313 yards on 32 carries, and four touchdowns.

"We run out of a tight formation, the spread and what I call the mini-spread," Robles said in between preparation for Friday's game at Marathon (0-6). "You don't stop us by just concentrating on one thing. That's why a lot of teams that have played us have been confused."

"We're not a one-man team

with Gallegos. Everybody else contributes very well. Even our center, Steve Moreland, has caught passes."

The Cougars — running second in District 8 behind defending state champion Fort Hancock (6-0) — also get plenty of offense from fullback Eddie Parra, quarterback Raul Marcos and end Leonel Hernandez.

Parra led Dell City with 135 yards rushing and two touchdowns in a 69-20 victory over Buena Vista. Hernandez caught a 30-yard touchdown pass from Gallegos with two seconds to play to beat Sierra Blanca.

Except for a 75-33 loss to Fort Hancock, Dell City has outscored its opposition 311-136. Defensively, Parra has led the team in tackles from his defensive end spot.

Other top defenders are nose-guard Mario Garcia, cornerback Ismael Mapula, defensive end Javier Martinez and Marcos at safety.

NOTES: Alpine (1-0 in District 5-3A and 6-0 overall) has been led by a first-year starter at quarterback, Oscar Lujan, a senior who has gained 702 yards rushing out of the option. Alpine, which beat Clint 41-25 last week, plays a non-district game Friday at McCamey (1-5). ... Eastwood (3-0, 5-1) leads El Paso's total offense leaders, averaging 391.2 yards per game, followed by Burgos (also 3-1) at 379.6 ypg and Irvn (6-0) at 356.0.
