

# Coronado comes up big in regional semifinals

CORONADO 4 LAMAR 2 Coronado defeated Arlington Lamar 4-2 in a shootout

Friday to advance to today's Region 1-5A soccer championship.

And the T-Birds can thank goalie Tim Mack for their success.

"Tim Mack did a terrific job," Coronado coach Victor Vargas said. "Our defense, even as tired as they were, kept together in overtime."

The game was tied 2-2 at the end of two overtimes, sending the game into a shootout.

Mack, a 6-foot-1 senior, made nine total saves — including four in the shootout — in the match played at Bedford's Pennington Field.

It's the first time Coronado reaches the regional championship in five tries.

### Martin, Mansfield fall in regional semis

BEDFORD — The Arlingtonarea boys soccer teams were no match for the El Paso high schools yesterday in the Region I semifinals at Pennington Field.

El Paso Coronado ran away from Martin, 2-0, and El Paso Hanks outlasted Mansfield, 2-1, in overtime.

The Coronado Thunderbirds (20-0) are scheduled to meet the Hanks Knights (17-2) in the regional championship game at 3 p.m. today at Pennington. It will be the first time two El Paso schools have met in the regional final. Coronado beat Hanks, 4-0, in January.

Martin (20-2-1), ranked No. 1 in the Star-Telegram area poll, gave up goals in the 24th and 25th minutes.

"They had a strong midfield," Martin coach Chris Naughton said. "They were fast."

That was apparent to the Pennington spectators on Coronado's first goal.

Thunderbirds midfielder Mark Rowland beat his marking back as he dribbled on the right side of the field, then fired a crossing pass to teammate Ryan Turnello for the 11-yard score. Rowland's pass was just beyond the reach of two Martin defenders.

"That first goal set the tone for the rest of the game," Coronado coach Victor Vargas said. "Even though they took more shots [11-9] than we did, a lot of them were hurried."

Turnello got his team's second goal 56 seconds later on a penalty kick when Martin's Tony Daniels was given a yellow card for a foulin the penalty area.

Even though the Thunderbirds had not played on artificial turf this season, they quickly picked up the touch needed to keep the ball moving across the rug instead of bouncing it through the air.

"We play a control game," Vargas said. "Once we got it on the turf, we kept it on the turf."

Coronado was only the second team all season to score two goals against Martin. Lamar had two against the Warriors in the two teams' regular-season finale.

Mansfield, ranked No. 5, Jost in regional semifinal when the Tigers offense failed to take any shots is the overtime.

Knights forward Everardo Fierro broke a 1-1 tie in the 91st minute when he punched in a loose ball that had squirmed past several players in the goalkeeper's box.

The second goal was particularly gratifying for Fierro because his penalty kick, with five minutes left in regulation, hit the crossbar.

"A good thing makes up for a bad thing in every situation, "Fierro said. "Thank God it did today. It was an on-and-off day, man."

## Don't call T-Birds favorites in soccer

El Paso high schools have had their share of disappointments when vying for state championships.

The most recent members of the "almost" club include the 1993 Hanks High boys soccer team, the 1994 and 1995 Bel Air girls softball teams and the 1995 Riverside boys basketball team.

But this weekend, two El Paso prep soccer teams could bring back a pair of Class 5A Texas crowns in the span of a few hours. It's the kind of thing that trivia questions are made of.

Friday afternoon the Coronado High boys face Houston's Klein Oak and the Franklin High girls take on Dallas Highland Park in the state soccer Final Four in Pflugerville.

If both advance, then clinch titles on Saturday, it would be a feat that University Interscholastic League official Peter Contreras says has never happened — two schools from the same city winning Class 5A championships in the same sport.

Off memory, nobody's pulled that trick," Contreras said Monday.

Possibly even more remarkable would be that both would complete undefeated seasons.

Plano, which earned a spot in the other boys semifinal Friday, almost pulled a soccer double three years

ago, but the girls team fell in the finals.

The Plano boys have been in the state Final Four five of the past six years. And it may be the only school with a shot at stopping powerful Coronado from throwing the UIL trophy over its shoulder and lugging it back to West El Paso.

But don't tell that to Coronado coach Victor Vargas. He doesn't like his team being pegged the favorites and he hasn't even thought about the 2-fer that he and Franklin coach Kati Hunyadi have a chance at this weekend.

But some gaudy team stats, like outscoring their opponents in the playoffs by a 29-1 mark and allowing a total of only 10 goals all season, clearly makes Coronado the favorite.

"I've never had a team top to bottom this solid," Vargas said. "Technically, we don't have much of a weak spot."

# Coronado coach is one man show

No need to tag Coronado High soccer coach Victor Vargas the "head" coach.

He's the T-Birds' only coach.

While many of the state's top prep soccer programs enjoy the luxury of junior varsity teams and assistant coaches, El Paso's school districts make due with one team and one coach.

That makes berths by the Coronado boys and Franklin girls in this weekend's state Class 5A Final Four even more impressive, Vargas feels.

"All the other coaches out at regionals last week were surprised that I don't have a junior varsity," Vargas said.

It's not so much the lack of a varsity assistant to help coach as it is the small things that Vargas must tend to himself that make the solo act difficult.

"I was taking the team to dinner at regionals and one of the other coaches there said, 'Oh, I let my assistant do that,' " Vargas said. "And all of those other little details, I get to take care of them all."

Vargas has made the loaded Westside soccer leagues his junior varsity, helping out youth coaches, who he considers unpaid assistants.

"I go visit a lot of games outside the school," he said.

Watching the T-Birds practice at times seems like someone accidently double-booked the practice field with 19-and-under and 15-and-under teams.

Vargas must coach a group daily as contrasting as 18-yearold University of New Mexicobound T-Bird senior star Ryan Turnello, a 30-goal scorer, and 14-year-old freshman Eddie Simmons, who stands only 4-foot-11.

"They (freshman) are fun to have around to beat up," senior Mark Rowland jokes.

But Rowland, a starter, knows from experience that practicing with the big boys has its advantages.

"It's better for us because when we were younger we learned a lot from the older guys," Rowland said.

And the way the T-Birds have played this season, allowing only 10 goals in 22 games, it's not as if Vargas hasn't had a chance to play his future stars.

"Everybody played in the regional finals," Vargas said of the 6-0 blowout of Hanks last Saturday.

In fact, Coronado has only been challenged once this season, in a 2-0 win over Arlington Martin last Friday in the regional semifinals.

The T-Birds have outscored opponents 29-1 in their four-game playoff run.

That has allowed a core of younger players, including freshmen like Simmons, Marcos Carrillo and Arnold Ken-Barajas, the chance to travel to Pfluger-ville for the Final Four.

Consider it priceless playoff experience which could pay off for the assistant-less Vargas in coming years.

### Coronado boys convinced

The undefeated state Final Four-bound Coronado boys soccer team isn't exactly acting like a car full of 8-year-olds on their way to Disneyland.

Not conceited, just convinced.

It's their team motto. Following a 1995 season, which ended in what they feel was an unjustified loss, the team is left with a certain aura of confidence. But don't call it cockiness.

"I think the boys have it in their minds that they will succeed — they are a focused team," Coach Victor Vargas said.

Not conceited, just convinced.

A double-overtime defeat to Arlington Martin, on a penaltykick goal in the Round of 8, prevented the T-Birds from advancing to the Final Four a year ago. And the long trip home has never been forgotten.

"We were full of frustration and promises to come back," senior Gabe Lepe said. "We wanted to make sure we saw Martin again — and beat them bad."

With that setback now avenged — Coronado beat Martin 2-0 last Friday in the Round of 16 — the team has taken a la-de-da approach for the state championship tournament, where they will likely be playing in front of more than 3,000 people.

Not conceited, just convinced.

"At the moment, it hasn't sunk in. But by the time we get there, it'll start sinking in," said senior Mark Rowland.

Coronado was scheduled to leave today on a noon flight for Austin. The state semifinal vs. Houston Klein Oak is scheduled for 4:30 p.m. MST Friday in nearby Pflugerville.

No one can really blame Coronado for its confidence heading into the game, after outscoring opponents 29-1 in its playoff run.

"When you beat teams like 8-0, you get to be a little bit confident," said Rowland.

The T-Birds don't think they've seen the top soccer in the state yet, however.

"I think we're going to see a lot better soccer at state," Lepe said

But the likes of the rest of the Final Four, Houston Klein Oak, San Antonio MacArthur and even defending state champ Plano, a school with an enrollment of more than 6,000 students, isn't fazing the T-Birds.

"They know in their minds that they had set that goal (state championship)," Vargas said. "We are going to do it."

PFLUGERVILLE — El Paso Coronado came into Friday's state boys soccer semifinals with some of the most impressive numbers seen in the history of this tournament, but many wondered if the Thunderbirds were for real.

Klein Oak, for one, can attest they are.

Led by a first-half hat trick by Ryan Turnello, the Thunderbirds beat the Panthers 5-1 on a wet, cold night at Kuempel Stadium. The loss ended Klein Oak's fairy-tale season at 18-4-3.

"They think this takes away from their season, but it doesn't," Klein Oak coach Tom Viehoefer said of his players. "We're disappointed, but we gave it our best shot. We had a few flaws, and they were good enough to exploit them."

The Thunderbirds, who outscored their opponents 120-10 entering Friday's match, scored four minutes in and then continued to show solid ball control and movement. Coronado keeper Adrian Santana looked shaky, but the Panthers couldn't get enough going offensively to take advantage.

"We got outplayed, I won't argue that," Viehoefer said. "They're good ... what can I say? It's no fluke that they're here."

Coronado, playing with a stiff breeze at its back in the first half, opened the scoring when Turnello took a throw-in and let loose with low rocket that eluded Klein Oak keeper Brian Diamond.


Diamond made a sparkling save minutes later on a rip by Steven Pena, but had no chance in the 26th minute when a 40-yard free kick by Rick Wilson ricocheted off the crossbar to a wide-open Turnello, who directed the ball into the open goal.

The Thunderbirds made it 3-0 in the final minute of the opening half after the Panthers couldn't clear the ball. On a quick counter, Turnello controlled a lead pass from Wilson off his chest and tucked it past a helpless Diamond.

"When they got that third goal, I thought that might be the nail in the coffin," Viehoefer said. "We could get away with two, but the third one was just too much. Then we didn't do anything in the second half."

Klein Oak cut its deficit to 3-1 in the 54th minute when Carlos Chavez stripped a Coronado defender and then toe-punched an 18-yard shot that clipped off Santana's hands into the goal.

Chavez then had another golden

opportunity in the 68th minute when he got behind the defense, but his rushed shot went right at Santana.

On the other side of the field, Panthers forward Ronnie Curry (26 goals and 13 assists entering the match) couldn't elude the close marking of Juan Guerrero. With Guerrero all over him, Curry was unable to get a shot on goal.

"They put their fastest man on me and Carlos was able to eat his guy up, but we just weren't able to capitalize on our chances," Curry With the Panthers pressing to score, Wilson and Pena each scored on breakaways in the final 11 min

"We pushed up and got burned but we had to take some chances,' Viehoefer said. "I don't think we played well as a team in the second half. We felt the pressure to score and tried to do too much individual by."

The Thunderbirds (23-0) will mee Plano (18-1-7), which beat San Anto nio MacArthur (19-3-3) 6-0 on Fri day, in today's 2:30 p.m. final.





Victor Vargas takes no credit. His players, he says, are the reason he was named 1996 Boys Soccer Coach of the Year in Texas.

"We had strong, dedicated kids," the 47-year-old Coronado coach said. "They made up their minds after losing in the regional finals last year. They kinda felt then that they should have gone to the final four. They set the goal of winning state."

Winning they did: 24 without a loss, including 3-2 over Plano for the Class 5A championship this spring. That record also elevated the T-Birds to the No. 3 spot in the nation.


When Coronado began a soccer program 12 years ago, Var-


