
A right-footed soccer-style kicker, Steve Azar became NIU's all-time leading scorer and the only player in NIU football history to earn all-conference honors four times. As a freshman in 2000, Azar not only earned All-MAC Honorable Mention recognition, but was also named a First Team Freshman All-America by Football News and a Second Team Freshman All-America by The Sporting News. During



his sophomore campaign in 2001, Azar was a First Team All-MAC honoree and the league's Co-Special Teams Player of the Year as he set a school record with 20 field goals made, a mark he would break during his senior season with 21. An All-MAC Second Team honoree as a junior in 2002, Azar closed his career with his second First Team All-MAC honor in 2003, while being named the MAC's Special Teams Player of the Year and a Lou Groza Award semifinalist, both for the second time in his Huskie career. He was named MAC Player of the Week an amazing eight times. The Colorado Springs, Colorado, native established at least 15 school records, including Most Points Scored, Career (370); Most Field Goals Made, Career and Season (73/21); Most Field Goals Attempted, Career (92); and Highest Field Goal Percentage, Career and Season (.793/.933). His 370 career kick-scoring points and 73 field goals were not only NIU records, but also established new standards in Mid-American Conference history. In addition, Azar owned five of the six longest field goals in school history by the end of his career, including a record 52-yarder vs. nationally-ranked Maryland on national TV in the 2003 season opener at Huskie Stadium.

Steve Azar simply is the best kicker I was around in my 40 years of coaching football, 34 years at the collegiate level.

I was the head coach at Northern Illinois University in DeKalb, IL, from 1996 to 2007. In the spring of 2000 we received a letter from a young man in Colorado Springs, CO, 1,000 miles from our location, asking about an opportunity to walk on to our football program. We had just finished our recruiting for that year and had recruited and signed a young man from our area to replace our kicker who had graduated. Our recruiting coordinator watched some tape featuring Steve and liked what he saw, so he asked me what we wanted to do about him, since we had a kicker set for that recruiting class. I told him to explain the situation to Steve, but if he wanted to walk on, we'd give him an opportunity. Steve had researched all the Division I schools that had graduated their kickers and had written to all of them. Thank goodness we responded to his request to be a part of our program.

Steve arrived on campus in the fall of 2000 and within three weeks had won the placekicking job, clearly beating out the young man we had just recruited. Steve would be our kicker for the next four years, 48 games. What a career he had as a Huskie.


Through the 50+ years of NIU being a Division I football program they've had several All-Americans, two NCAA rushing leaders, and a Heisman Trophy finalist, but Steve Azar is NIU's leading scorer — with 370 points — in school history. He is the career leader in field goals, with 79, and the career leader in field goal percentage, with a stellar 79 percent. In addition, Steve won All MidAmerican Conference Honors all four years he was on our team, was twice named MAC Special Teams Player of the Year, and twice named a Lou Groza Award semi-finalist, a prestigious national award.

Steve was at his best in big games. In 2003 we had a magical football season. In our season opener we beat #12-ranked Maryland 20-13 in overtime. Steve had a 52-yard field goal in that game. A couple of weeks later we played in Tuscaloosa, AL, and beat #21-ranked Alabama 19-16. And Steve had a 50-yard field goal in that game. He was not only prolific and accurate, he was a clutch performer.

His is a great story of a young man seemingly out of nowhere and having what is a hall of fame career. Very shortly after becoming eligible for NIU's Athletics Hall of Fame, Steve was elected, before several of his teammates who had played in the NFL.

I proudly support Steve Azar's nomination for your Hall of Fame because I truly believe he is most deserving of that honor.

During my time at Northern Illinois University, our football team experienced a massive shift in success and culture. I came into a struggling program that had experienced a lot of turnover but also had faith in 2<sup>nd</sup> year head coach Joe Novak.

Joe Novak built a successful program based on hard work and believing in each other. His motto was "Those who Stay will be Champions". He worked hard to recruit the right people that would eventually become great teammates. His method was to build from within, not bring in transfer players from other schools. He looked for young talented athletes that could grow up with the program but also have an immediate impact.

Steve Azar exemplifies the exact type of student athlete that Joe Novak was looking for. His impact was felt immediately, not only on the field, but also in the locker room. During his time at Northern Illinois, Azar set several school records for field goals and scoring, contributing to the team's successes in the Mid-American Conference.

Eventually, the team capped off a 10-2 season in 2003 that was filled with highlights. On opening weekend, the Huskies beat No. 15 Maryland, then, traveled to Tuscaloosa and beat No. 21 Alabama. After beating Iowa State the following week, the Huskies were rolling and won their first 7 games. Following their week 5 win against Ohio, the first BCS standings were released, and by week 7 the Huskies had climbed to No. 10 overall.

There's no question that Steve's contributions were enormous to the success of this team. Azar's dedication to the sport and his achievements as a collegiate athlete have left a lasting legacy at NIU, where he is remembered as one of the standout kickers in the program's history.

As someone that was fortunate enough to play 11 seasons in the NFL, I was surrounded by some of the best kickers in the game including Mike Vanderjagt and Adam Vinatieri. Steve certainly had a similar impact at the college level for our teams at Northern Illinois University.

Ryan Diem

Ryan Diem Bio:

Ryan, a Chicago native, attended Northern Illinois University where he served as captain on the football team and was awarded All American status. Diem was selected by the Indianapolis Colts in the 2001 NFL Draft. Over the course of 11 seasons with the Colts, he had 150 starts in 157 appearances, 106 wins as a starter; earning him a spot as 1 of only 13 Colts players to participate in 100+ career wins in the history of the franchise. During that period, the Colts Offensive Line was #1 in the NFL for least sacks allowed - totaling only 187 sacks over 160 games. On February 4<sup>th</sup>, 2007 Diem earned the crowning achievement of his career as a Super Bowl XLI Champion.

# Huskie PK Azar named to Frosh All-America squad

DeKALB - For the 2000 Northern Illinois University football team and head coach Joe Novak, the postsesson honors continue to accumulate.

The latest individual accolade for Novak's Huskies? Placekicker Steve Azar (Colorado Springs, CO / Highlands Ranch) made The Sporting News Second-Team Freshman All-America squad. The major-college allfrosh team is featured in the Dec. 4 issue of TSN, the weekly sports tabloid which is currently on the newsstands.

Earlier this week, the 5foot-7, 182-pound red-shirt freshman kicking specialist made the coaches' Honorable Mention All-Mid-American Conference team and was the only frosh performer on the 60-man all-league team.

"This is another opportuni-ty-makes-good story," Novak said. "Steve literally walked in out of the blue and wanted s chance to kick. Our All-MAC kicker Kent Baker graduated last year.

"Steve eventually won our plucekicking job and kicked beyond our expectations. He's a good game day kicker. The 14 field goals in a row, I've never been around that type of kicking before. He sure had

a solid year for us."

Nationally, Azar ranks in two NCAA Division 1-A statis-


two NCAA Division 1-A statis-tics categories this week — No. 9 in field goals (1.56 per game average) and No. 19 in overall scening (8.9 ppg. average). In both NCAA categories, he is the top freshman in the country. In the MAC, Azar appears in four league state areas — No. 1 in kick-scening (80 points), No. 1 in field-goal percentage (1933). No. 4 in

Central Michigan duplicated NIU's second-best single-game trey output. Those 16 kick-scoring points vs. CMU represented the third-best single-game performance in school history.

The 28 consecutive PAT streak was the third longest in NIU annals and the 14 field goals marked the fourth-best all-time single-season total. Azar's 44-yard field goal vs. Central Florida tied the seventh-longest such kick in the Northern Illinois Record Book.

This past season, he converted 38-of-40 PATs and 14-of-15 field goals for 80 points.

Two other Mid-Am players made TSN 2000 Frosh All-America team -- Central Michigan punter Brian Brandt (second-team defense) and Miami (OH) linebacker Terrell Jones (third-team defense). Azar was the first Huskie frosh All-America football selection since fullback Adam Dach made The Sporting News honor unit in 1988.

AUBURN K Damon Duval has a powerful leg and hit 17 of 27 FG's with a long of 51 including 3 game winners, and averaged a super 39.9 net punting. Their return game was only fair and should be improved. They should fare better than their solid #18 finish last year.

N ILLINOIS The Huskies were #8 in my special teams rankings in 2000. They slipped a little last year, dropping to #23. P Jimmy Irwin had a solid net of 36.4 and KR Michael Turner averaged 35.4 on 9 ret's. NI blocked 3 punts and had 2 TD's on returns and were +3 in the TD/Blk category. K Steve Azar hit 20 of 26 FG's despite being only 90% last year due to an injury. They not only have the MAC's top special teams unit but are a contender for the top spot overall.

NEBRASKA The Huskers normally finish in my top 20. After a rare off-year in 2000 when the team finished #64, they showed great improvement last year (#2). Josh Davis averaged 26.5 on 30 KR's and this team's lowest PR average recently has been 10.46. Last year DeJuan Groce averaged 15.4 on 36 returns, P Kyle Larson had a net of 36.7 and 2 VHT kickers are back including Josh Brown who hit 10 of 14 with 1 miss from 50+. NU has blocked 11 punts the last 3 years.

LSU Saban plays a lot of starters on this unit, showing it's a priority. Coach Ron Turner of Illinois said after their bowl game, "Just look at their coverage team, they look like a team of world class sprinters." P Donnie Jones had a net of 39.4 and Domanick Davis averaged 13.4 on PR's last year and 23.4 on KR's in 2000. Devery Henderson averaged 25.3 on 7 KR's last year. They allowed just 15.2 on KR's due to their coverage units and with everyone back they will contend for top 10 honors.

 TCU TCU finished #3 in my special teams rankings in 2000 but had to replace super K Chris Kaylakie. Nick Browne, a member of TCU's soccer team, hit 14 of 20 FG's with a long of 50 and is back. Jason Goss averaged 9.8 on PR's. LaTarence Dunbar, who averaged 33.5 on KR's in 2000, slipped to 19.5 last year and should return to form. Shane Hudnell records many TB's on KO's and the team allowed just 18.2 on KR's. P Joey Biasatti had a net of 39.2 and all of the key components are back. J and

GEORGIA TECH Last year O'Leary experimented with some walk-ons on special teams and their KR defense average slipped from 16.3 to 22.5. P's Dan Dyke and Chris Moorehouse averaged 41.3 with the net of 37.8. PR Kelly Rhino set an ACC record with 520 PR yards (10.4). KR Kelly Campbell averaged 23.1. Luke Manget hit 20 of 29 FG's with a long of 51 and with everyone back, GT will improve upon its #47 finish last year.

14. TENNESSEE P Dustin Colquitt fixed some mechanical flaws midseason and averaged 45.1 over the last 6 games and should have a strong year. KR Leonard Scott returns and led the SEC in KR's in 1999 with a 26.3 average. PR Rashad Baker averaged 9.1. K Alex Walls hit 16 of 21 with a long of 51 and frosh James Wilholt had 78% of his KO's go for TB's including 11

Grouac through the uprights in HS. 3.7 last 15. E CAROLINA JUGO P Jarad Preston came in and simply averaged 44.1 per boot (#12 in NCAA). 

One of the premier placekickers in the country, he became the first player in school history to earn All-Mid American Conference honors four times in a career Cool under pressure, he proved to be an invaluable performer with several victories produced by his leg in the final seconds of games He has that air of confidence to him that only quality kickers possess In 44 games, he set the school career record with 370 points, making 73 of 92 field goals (79.3 percent) and 151 of 158 extra point (95.6 percent) attempts His 370 points broke the previous school mark of 253 points by John Ivanic (1987-90) and the Mid American Conference kick-scoring record of 320 points by Toledo's Todd American Conference kick-scoring record of 320 points by Toledo's Todd American (1998-2001) His 151 PATs topped the old Huskie all-time record of 115 by Ivanic and his 73 field goals shattered Ivanic's previous NIU record of 46.

Positives: Has a short frame, but it displays good bone structure and well-built thighs and calves Has a strong leg that delivers pop and explosion Gets the ball up and off the ground with a quick rise Very accurate on intermediate field goals Has little problems kicking in poor weather conditions Handles pressure well Hard worker in the weight room Right-footed soccer-style kicker who gets good distance upon contact Can kick from either hash point with equal success Knows how

to adjust his kicking motion and style based on field position and weather conditions.

Negatives: Can kick the ball into the end zone at times, but has only marginal hang time on his kickoffs Has good mental toughness and will get down field to help the coverage unit, but lacks strength and size to do anything more than get into the returner's way Back-up punter, but does not have the leg to be consistent in that area.


